Darryl is once again representing NZ at the World MTBO Champs, which are being held in Finland from the $9^{th} - 14^{th}$ of July.

He will be running in the Sprint and Middle distance races as well as the relay. This is an amazing achievement for such a new 'elite', being only 21. Then he joins Amber in representing New Zealand in the Pinestars test match against Australia at the Queensland Champs.

Four years ago Stewart suggested he organise people to do control collection, rather than leave it to the setter/vetter/event helpers and other volunteers on the day. 
How long have you been orienteering?

Dave Smith (founder member) tells me the club started in 1977, so I would have gone to my first event two or three years later. I became stale after fifteen years and had a complete break for three years, so let me see..... that's about twenty years.

CONTROL COLLECTION - 2006

The last time I wrote on this subject was.....would you believe 2002?

Well I am writing about it again mainly for the benefit of all those new people in the club.

The aim is to help the Setter and Vetter on the day to get those controls in, and to spread the task relatively evenly amongst those in the club that are able and willing.

I do not organise collectors for the Summer Series or any other Street and Park events with the exception of Te Mata Park. My reason is that there are plenty of roads on these maps enabling the Setter to drop collectors off at the most distant controls, and there is invariably a family involved.

I organise it the week before the event, thinking that most people know by then if they will be there or not. I discuss it with the Setter first, followed by the Vetter and the Assistants for the day. If these people have family there, they can often take care of the job. If they are a bit short then I start phoning around.

New orienteers enjoy doing this. It gives them a good experience of walking the map with no pressure, and means they can learn a great deal. Collection starts close to 3pm, so it makes sense to start your course about 11.30a.m., finish, have your lunch and recover, ready to go out again to collect controls. The golden rule is **ONLY COLLECT THE CONTROLS ON YOUR LIST.** If you pass close by another control ... leave it. The reason is that the person who is supposed to collect it arrives where they think it should be and hello... it is not there. They then spend some considerable time trying to find it.

The short period of daylight in the middle of winter introduces another element to the collection of controls. There is not a lot of time to do the job. So it pays the Setter for the day to have it already planned with black and white photocopies of the map at the ready with collection areas marked out. The collection area also needs to match the ability of the collector. That needs some thought on my part and yours.

I think I have covered all the bases, but if you have any comments please make contact with me.

CLUB 'O' TOPS.

For some time now there has been an undercurrent of discontent, primarily amongst younger club members, with our club O tops. Committee would like to hear club members views on our present tops and if there is a need for change.

At present you will see members wearing two different styles of tops. Both are in the club colours of green, black and white but are made out of different fabric, the earlier 'holey' material being no longer available. Tops are made locally, on demand and to order eg you may have noticed Stewart Hyslop has a long sleeved version.

Why wear a club O top? Well, it means you don't have to worry about what to wear at each event but the main reason is for 'away' events when you are running for Hawkes Bay. A sea of green, black and white tops strikes terror into all opposition, because we are consistently one of the top clubs in New Zealand and people definitely recognise our colours.

And for some this is the problem. Too bright (well, the green is!). Too obvious (do we want people to see us coming?) For others they feel the style is outdated, especially when many clubs in the last year are suddenly sporting very flash looking O tops. For others, there is no problem. What we have is fine. It's distinctive and people immediately know you're a Hawkes Bay runner.

THANKS TERRY

Club President, Compass Points Editor, Fixtures Officer and Committee member. That's a pretty strong list of responsibilities for someone to take on in their first seven years of Orienteering.

Terry Russell admits to being one of those who became addicted to the sport right from the start and was so keen to be involved in the club he jumped in the deep end as editor of 'Compass Points' after less than a year with Orienteering. He went on committee at the same time, staying on for six years. After two years as Editor (and winning the Silva award for best magazine) he moved on to Fixtures Officer for two years and then became President for two years, stepping down at the end of 2003.

He vividly remembers his first event at Raretu and remembers it was in April 1997, as Pamela was heavily pregnant with Sean at the time. Actually he only went along to take his daughter Jenny and he had no intention of doing a course. At Hastings Girls High, Jenny was friends with an Exchange student who was good at Orienteering and persuaded Jenny to 'give it a go'. At the event Geoff persuaded Terry 'to give it a go', so he and Jason went off on a Yellow course, and, as you would expect when not dressed for the occasion, got rather dirty for their efforts. They also got a little bit lost, as Terry was more used to 1;50,000 maps and took them a tad too far!!! But he was hooked and basically never missed a club event for the next six years.

The attraction of the sport for Terry is the chance to get out into the bush and farmland and areas off the beaten track. He likes the combination of running and thinking which also means you don't notice the distance so much because your mind is so busy. As his job became increasingly 'people focussed' he has also enjoyed just being out on his own, with no worries about work and people 'coming at you' all the time. And of course he has enjoyed the company of the great people in our club.

His favourite maps are Smedley and Maraetotara, although both presented him with major challenges at first. Terry attempted his first Orange course at Maraetotara, taking three hours. That map has since been conquered and he has had many good runs there subsequently. Smedley was when Terry tackled his first Red course. After one hour and NOT finding the first control he decided to DNF and get home to watch the rugby. The only problem was Jenny was out on an Orange. He thought he would do the Orange in reverse and pick her up that way, but after drawing the Orange course on his original map and heading off, he switched to his original Red course and so well and truly missed the rugby. Struggling orienteers can certainly take heart from those rather long times, as Terry now is an extremely competent Red Long competitor.

Successes have been winning M40 at the HB Club Champs last year, coming second in M40 for the Short O at the Wellington Champs in 2002 and he is also the HB Club Short O champ, a event no longer held. He could also have won the M40 Short O event at the Wellington Champs held at Smedley in 2003. After having a good run and coming in 8–10 minutes ahead of the rest of the field Terry had a drink and a quick change of clothes before heading into the tent to help check control cards. Oops, this person's missed a control. And guess whose clip card it was! A brief conversation with a fellow club member between controls 8 and 9 had been enough to distract him and


look back at his map at control number 9 instead of 8, both on similar features! With such a large lead he probably still would have won had he not missed number 8.

Terry admires endurance athletes and has competed in several adventure races and rogaines himself. In earlier years he and Richard Lynn competed together in rogaines, he has competed in the local 6 hour adventure race for the last two years, run in the Kaweka Challenge on several occasions and this year competed in the Tararua 24 hour event with Chris Howell and Allan Hughes. He is keen to do more of these types of events but would like to be fitter, something he hopes to remedy with his move to Tauranga.

Terry has worked for Bearsley Farms Ltd since 1999, starting as Orchard Manager but with an increase in leased orchards in 2003 he became the Operations Manager in 2004 and the workload just kept increasing. Although he has enjoyed the work, the balance between work and free time was not right, as work was consuming his whole life, interfering with family life, holidays and of course orienteering. The move to Tauranga was a hard decision to make but as Accounts Manager for Seeka Kiwifruit Industries he will have a lot more free time and for the first time in his working life will have the time between Christmas and New Year totally free from work. The kiwifruit industry has a much 'friendlier' season than the apple industry so he should now be able to attend Nationals on a regular basis.

With his children Jenny and Jason still floating round in Hawke's Bay, Terry hopes to return on a regular basis to compete in OYs or other major events in the Bay and of course will stay a club member so he can still receive his copy of Compass Points to keep him up to date with everything that's happening within the club.

Thanks for all your hard work over the last seven years Terry and good luck to you and Samantha on your move to Tauranga.



Magic Moment...

From Minnow to Magnificence in 12 months!



We made it! Central Magic has won the Superseries teams competition! With a lead of 57 points going into Queens Birthday, the team scored 56 and 58 points, to make a total of 890. Home team and last year's winner MacNut Northerners scored *slightly* higher at QB, but they were so far behind it wasn't funny – they ended on 732. The possible threat from Bivouac Southerly Storm evaporated with a low turnout – some of their stalwarts are overseas. They finished with 817.

So the winning margin was 73. In 2003 when the team competition began, Magic finished 267 points behind the winner. In 2004, 188 behind. Last year it was 160 in arrears. A steady improvement, but such was the outlook that some commentators suggested re-drawing the team boundaries for better competition! They're not saying that now®

And in the individual contest Magician Karl Dravitzki (Orienteering Taranaki) also finished on top as expected. With the lowest three scores discounted he made 145 points, compared to the 123 of last year's winner Chris Forne (PAPO). Rob Jessop (AOC/PAPO and the 2003 winner) was third.

But look at who comes next. Of the next 8 places, *six* were filled by Central Magic runners! Ross Morrison (HBOC) 4th; Bryn Davies (RKOC) 5th; James Bradshaw (WOC) 6th; Neil Kerrison (OT) 8th; Andrew McCarthy (OHV) 9th=; and Bill Edwards (OHV) 11th. In terms of the team competition, it's the solidity of these runners which underpins the result – the team points scale is a flat one unlike the individual scale which falls off more steeply.

In the womens contest MacNut's Tania Robinson won ahead of a dead heat for second: between ex-WOC member Penny Kane and Lara Prince (PAPO). Last year's winner Rachel Smith was 4th.

Magic has not been traditionally strong in the womens department, and has been further weakened by the absence of RK's Claire Paterson with injury; and injury also prevented rising star Amber Morrison (HBOC) from running to her potential. However Amber finished 8th, just ahead of Lizzie Ingham (WOC). Both entered only selected elite races as they are still juniors.

They ran other races in the 20 class, which counts for the new Junior Superseries. Still settling down, it suffers from the natural desire to run in the open class where practical, ie middle and sprint distances. That is something the new HP Director will have to look at – perhaps the 20 and 21 classes can run on the same courses for these short distances, and the top juniors can score junior points as well as measuring themselves against the senior standard.

In spite of spreading their points over two competitions, Ingham won the junior series with Morrison 2nd equal to Hamilton's Tineke Berthelsen. And that's not all. Kate Rea (OHV) was 4th; Kirsty Turner (WOC) 5th; Tessa Ramsden (RKOC) 7th; Rachel Goodwin (HBOC) 8th. And 6 of the next 10 were Magic as well. *Is that called domination or what???*

The boys for some reason weren't so strong, with HB's Scott McDonald just making it into the top 10 by equalling NWOC's Thomas Reynolds. Jack Vincent (also HBOC) was 12th. Nevertheless the large base generated by the efforts of HBOC and the CSW events is going to pay dividends in the near future.

Talking of the near future, the high-performance focus now turns to World Championships: Junior in Lithuania 2-7 July, and Senior in Denmark 1-5 Aug. There's also a test-match with Australia to be held in Queensland 19-20 Aug. The test team hasn't been announced yet, but Magic Members of the JWOC team are Lizzie Ingham, Amber Morrison and Kate Rea; they will already be in Europe when you read this. The other woman is Tineke Berthelsen; the men are Simon Addison (HOC), Riki Cambridge (DOC), Simon Jager (AOC), Alastair Long (CMOC) and Sam McNally (ROC). Coach/Manager is Magician Neil Kerrison.

And three of the four men in the WOC team are also Magic Herdsmen. They are James Bradshaw, Karl Dravitzki and Ross Morrison. The other male is experienced campaigner Rob Jessop, while the women are Jenni Adams (PAPO, at present living in Sweden), Lara Prince (PAPO) and Tania Robinson (CMOC).

The World Championship is the pinnacle, the goal. Superseries rounds, Test matches, they are all ways and means of raising standards through intensifying competition close to home. We wish team members the very best, Magicians and otherwise, and with rising standards of internet reporting will be following you with the keenest of interest.

Amber was four and Ross six. Derek and Aunty Pamela accompanied Ross around their first course on the old Granules (Maraetotara) map. Meanwhile Uncle Geoff strolled around a course with Val carrying Amber in a backpack and the Morrison orienteering dynasty was begun.

Progress

Ross progressed quickly. By the time he was 11 he was running for the N.Z. M16 team against Australia's best and doing well. From a very young age he was beating nationally ranked adults. At high school he won the North Island Secondary School's Senior Championships four times. He has represented N.Z. at two Junior World Championships finishing 10th in the 2005 Sprint race and qualifying 5th in his heat for the A Final of the Middle distance race. In the last year he has become the first Hawkes Bay Elite to win at a major event.

Amber's progress was initially slower but progress was rapid after she was selected for the N.Z. Secondary Schools' team trip to Australia in 2003 and saw what was required to be up with the best. She has won many N.Z. and N.Z. Secondary School titles and was selected to represent N.Z., as an Elite, while still at secondary school.

The Latest


Ross's feats have resulted him being selected for the Sprint, Middle Distance and Relay at this year's World Champs in Denmark.

Ross and Amber have shown it is possible for juniors from Hawkes Bay to succeed at the International level. With hard work there is no reason the next success story could not be you!



Central Districts Orienteering Champs 20/21 May 2006

I couldn't persuade the family to join me for the CD Champs in Rotorua so I trundled up in the ute for the long distance event on Saturday and the MTBO on Sunday. The long distance event was held on the extension to the Okere map on the north side of the Kaituna river. In a small turnout from Hawke's Bay only some of the usual villains were there, Hamish & Rachel Goodwin, Brett & Craig Sceats, Kate Haselhoft, Deborah Turner, Derek and Duncan Morrison.

The map is mainly fast open farmland with scrubby patches and a myriad of electric fences. You could hear everyone groan as the starter said the electric fences are off...and on. It looked at times as if the ground was heating up under runners' feet as they found new and novel ways to get across them. Hamish took the superman approach, leaping them in a single bound. Brett tried the Moses method, believing if he ran at them fast enough the fence would magically part. I went for the nervous nellie style, alternating between leaping them like a gazelle and using the poultry method (the chicken theory). Actually a gazelle is probably rather more graceful than I was.

Most of the route choices were fairly straight forward and the courses were on the short side but the courses were well planned for the limitations the map placed on the setter.

Outstanding results for the day came from Hamish who destroyed his opposition in the M40 grade, running a very quick 39:13, which equates to 8 minute kms. It was a strong indication of the form he was in prior to the QB event and the Club Champs. Rachel cleaned up W18, and although she was in a very lonely grade, she acquitted herself well, beating all the W40A runners, half the M50A runners and all but one in each of the M16 and M21AS grades. Deborah had a day to forget, taking nearly an hour longer than Patricia Aspin. Kate Haselhoft ran strongly to finish second just 3 minutes behind Katherine Hamilton of Rotorua. Duncan demolished his competitors in M16 and Brett was in good form taking out M14. Craig unfortunately had little opposition in M10 but made up for it by running another course as well. In the elite grades it was a close tussle between Karl Dravitzki and Neil Kerrison with Karl edging out Neil by 47 seconds. Rachel Smith won W21E by over two minutes from Rebecca.

In the Park O on Sunday morning, Deborah Turner was 3rd in W55, Brett and Craig cleaned up the M14 grade with Craig edging out Brett by 10 seconds. Must have been the lag effect from the electric fence the day before slowing Brett down! Kate Haselhoft ran well in W14 to finish 7th in a field headed by Rotorua runners. Neil Kerrison reversed the result from the day before to beat Karl by 10 seconds and Rachel continued to dominate W21 winning again from Rebecca.

Then it was on to the mountain bike orienteering in Whakarewarewa forest. I enjoy this event because it gives me the excuse to take the mountain bike to Rotorua and ride some really good single track with more space between the trees than at Esk mountain bike park. For a rider of my ability that is important. The tracks don't seem to get as slippery as Esk and generally aren't as technical or narrow to ride. Not that I rode all that well. Mind you a map table would help a lot. It is hard to keep track of where you are on the map holding it in your hand. Deborah and I were the only HB competitors, which is a shame because the Whakarewarewa forest can give a lot of route choice and some interesting tracks to ride For the record, I finished a distant third and Deborah was just beaten into 4th by 19 seconds.

Some Hawkes Bay highlights included


- Ruth Vincent's win by 15 minutes in the W40AS Middle Distance.



The Event

If I had any doubts as to why the club won the "Club of the Year" at the sports awards, I can now clearly see why! I have managed to avoid getting too involved in the organization of a "major" event for the club, but I was so impressed with the number of people (and their skills) who just step up and make it all look so easy. To be honest I don't think I realized how big this event had become when I discovered that the original setter

was unavailable and I offered to set the courses.

I live in Napier, so the close proximity of the map was great for someone from a 1-car family as I was able to cycle to the map for all the planning. My planning started with a visit to Bob Pocknall who just happens to be Forest Manager for all the forest on the map. It became pretty obvious that the barn was the most suitable location for the event center so I began to plan some courses around this. I enjoy course planning (more than I enjoy putting all the controls out!). I liken it to a big puzzle where you have to fit all the pieces together to get the answer. The funny thing is that there is no right answer to the puzzle and you only really know if you got a good answer after 200+ people have tested it – (by which time it is too late to change it!). This event gave me a number of challenges

The map is very steep.

I had to set 3 white courses and 2 yellow courses.

There were going to be a lot of inexperienced Orienteers.

• I wanted to create some spectator interest.

From the results and the feedback I got at (and after) the event, I think the courses worked out about right. I managed to keep the climb right down on the Yellow and White courses and I was really pleased to see that there were hardly any DNF's on these courses. Course 8 which was for the Year 7/8 (Intermediate school age) had the biggest number of runners. A few got into trouble between controls 4-6 where the fence they were supposed to follow had a steep downhill, then uphill then downhill again. To make matters worse the fence vanished under blackberry at one point. Fortunately our spotter Wayne rescued a few kids, but some did get into trouble and in hindsight there probably should have been another control here.

Although I was reasonably happy with the red courses, I was aware that the climb was a bit brutal. I actually did adjust the courses to try and lower it a bit. In the end I thought that a 40 minute winning time was probably a bit optimistic. However these kids keep amazing me with their performances and it was a championship race so I let them have it. Obviously my hunch was proved right with the winning times being 48-49 minutes. An unfortunate impact was that there was no real Red Short course for club members and the

club times for Courses 1 & 2 were pretty long. On a more positive note, I was most happy with the Orange courses 3 & 4 as I think they had some good route choice legs and some interesting control sites. Hopefully the competitors thought so also.

I think the spectator area worked out quite well and it was neat to see so many people watching, as our sport

is usually so spectator "unfriendly".

A big thanks to my international controller Ken Holst whose attention to detail was impressive and made me realize what a poor event controller I have been in the past. I have even forgiven the bugger for making me run half way across the map 5 minutes before the first start to move a control 2 meters! Ken had only recently controlled an OY so it was good of him to step up to help again.

Also a big thanks to Dave Fisher who made all the map corrections and assisted me getting all the pre-printed maps done. He even went over to Hastings to pick up the maps. He did a good job of ensuring that my over

zealous map corrections were a bit more realistic!

Thanks to Lesley Sceats who was the overall co-ordinator of the event. It is a huge job to co-ordinate all those entries and all the logistics that happen behind the scenes. The fact that I didn't have to worry about anything except courses and maps was evidence of a good event co-ordinator.

I think she gets thanked after every event we have, but once again thanks to Pam Morrison, who not only organized and operated the Sport Ident system but also keep an eye on the whole event. Pam is a bit like a good CEO, she stays in the background, but through a few timely phone calls and emails she ensures it all runs like clockwork.

Finally, thanks to all those (and there were many) who helped in some capacity on or before the event. I won't list them all here as Hamish has already thanked them in the results email. I was very impressed with the number of people who willingly offered to help and made the event run smoothly.

We certainly got enormous publicity after the event with a front-page heart warming story about Orienteering (featuring Morgan Spencer and Xavier Hapi). We also had other nice photos in the paper, including Deborah watching Stewart dancing, so I am sure the school champs will only get bigger and better next year.

The Races:

Senior Boys Championship: Scott MacDonald (Karamu) won his second consecutive Senior title from Jack Vincent (HVHS) and Duncan Morrison (NBHS). Duncan had the lead at the 3rd control and was within 9 seconds of Scott (with Jack a further 29 seconds back) at control 7. But from this point the race was all Scott's as he won nearly every leg to win by 2 minutes.

Senior Girls Championship: Rachel Goodwin (Iona) and Emma Watson (CHB) swapped the lead for the first part of their course with Emma leading by 37 seconds at control 5. Thereafter Rachel dominated the race to win by over 4 minutes from Emma with Chloe Gregory (HNHS) taking 3rd place.

Intermediate Boys Championship: Aari Barrett (Hastings Boys) totally dominated this race leading from start to finish. He had opened up a big lead by the second control and although he had no fastest splits from then on, his consistency gave him a 1:23 minute win over Rory Hart (Karamu). A mere 6 seconds further back was Nick Holder (HNHS) who had been passed by Rory at the second to last control. A very tight finish saw Hamish Patrick (HNHS) and Jamie Brigham-Watson (NBHS) both within 32 seconds of 2nd place.

Junior Girls Championship: Hannah Harty (Iona) led this race from start to finish after having a flying start to the first control. She eventually won by 2:13 from Olivia Gregory (HNHS) and Pip Beachen (NGH).
