EXTRACTS OF PRAISE FROM THE OTHER CLUB NEWSLETTERS ON AN INTERNATIONAL CENTRAL CLUB.

"My T-shirt of the year (indeed the past 5 years or longer!) award would go to Hawkes Bay for their grey and maroon international production.

TIM CLENDON-The Aussies were a good crowd and mixed well. They had one or two problems during their visit: the most notable being two members spending a night lost in the bush near Rotorua after going for an evening stroll. Not very good advertising for Orienteers.

PHIL MELLISOP-SOUTH AUCKLAND.

The orienteering circus which had begun to assemble at Awahitu the week before, homed in on Esk Forest-60 km north of Napier on the middle Saturday of the May school holidays. For many from the north, Paupo was the final jumping off point and the overnights woke to a crisp, clear morning with solid white frost on the ground.....and windscreens.

The drive to Esk Forest took us past the scenes of previous encounters.. Waimarama, Iwatahi, Tauhara and Pahautea, across the pine covered plateau of the Kaiangaroa Plains with the wonderful views of the peaks of the Kaimanawas, Ruapehu, Ngaruahoe, and Tongariro freshly mantled with an early fall of snow. The sky was clear, the sun shone and the mood was good as we approached "The Promised Land".

A patch of sun was found for the ritual taking of official team photos. first with faceless numbered torso, then with un-numbered, induced grins.

H.B.O.C. had the machinery efficiently in place and soon the start process was grinding relentlessly on. "10.32 starters, you may look at your blank map" "4..3..2...1....GO!"

What a contrast to the Awahitu map, all white and green, except for a few red circles and lines! New technique needed here. 6 metre contours left much unsaid but the un-crossable gully was. Probably most runners were too concerned with problems of orienteering to realise what a magnificent forest this was.. mature Douglas Fir, unpruned and un-thinned.. visibility limited at times twigs in the eyes of the unwary... free of fallen limbs and rubbish and the strangely sweetish scent of the Douglas Fir. We had a forest made to savour and enjoy, not to engage in battle.... for battles there were. Crowns were worn and heads rolled.. The results tell the story.

But the big thing was the Challenge. The crowd around the scoreboard became more and more excited as the pattern emerged.. estimates.. guesses.. calculations .. the last possible runner into effect the score, James Brewis, was in, and it was conceded that the day was won... by N.Z... 6-5 and by a total elapsed time of 24 seconds!

A great victory for N.Z. A great achievement for H.B.O.C., their first international. A beautiful forest..... go there if you can!

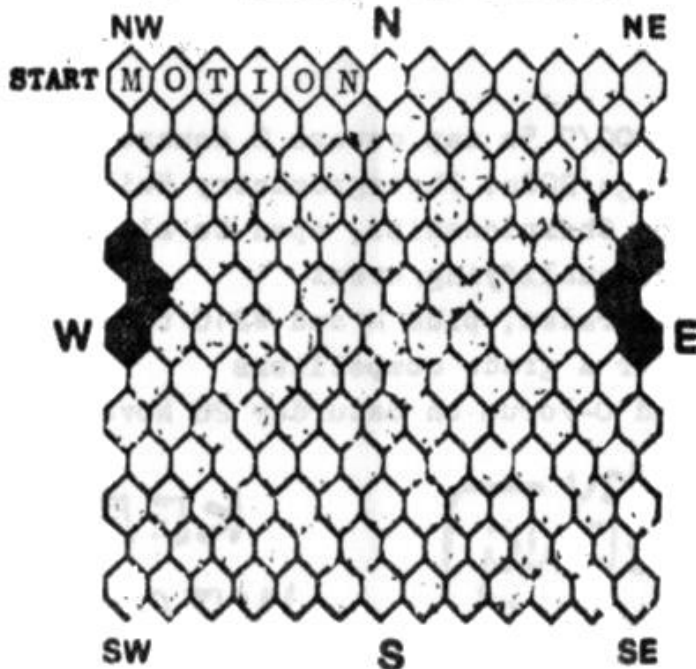

PROTEST PROCEDURE CLUB MEETINGS.

- 1) Protest against infringement of the rules by the organisers or a competitor shall be made in writing to the competition organisers within one hour of the closure of the finish or within 1/2 an hour of the competitor finishing, whichever is the earlier.
- 2) If a protest is against a result in the provisional lists it shall be raised within one hour of these lists being displayed.
- 3) A fee equal to twice the fee of entry for that day for that class in question shall accompany any protest.
- 4) The fee shall be returned if the protest is proved valid and necessary to avoid an unfair result.
- 5) A protest can only refer to one alleged contravention of the rules (e.g. one misplaced control) and must be submitted on an individual basis.
- 6) On occasion of such a protest, a three man jury of experienced club members shall be appointed by the meeting organisers.

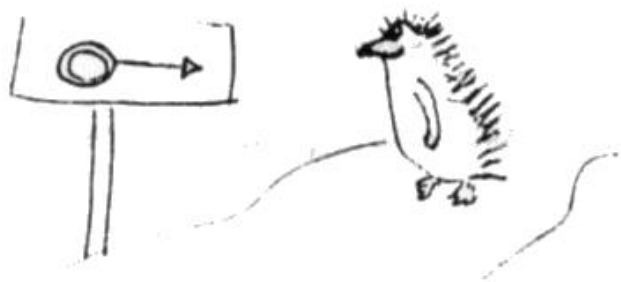
FROM THE HAMILTON NEWSLETTER. "O"-HELL!
