HAWKES BAY . . . . ED KIWI'S INTERCLUB CHALLENGE.

We were glad to be able to turn on some Hawkes Bay type weather to make our visitors feel at home. (I must admit I can remember think what an advantage it was to be an organiser with the temperatures we had!). On the organisation side - my apologies to those in the W35A, M35B, M17 grades. The problem was a wrong number on the control sheet. When compared to the recommended times for O.Y. winners, A, B, C & E courses were within or very close to the guidelines. Course F M13 was close to the time too. 47mins (rec. 30-40) W35B, W13, W43A (rec 30-40mins) were 85, 65, 83mins respectively and therefore too long. Course G M12 (20-30) mins, 37mins was close, W12 at 56mins on the same course was too long. An extra course or two would no doubt have over come the problem. I did not calculate the climb in Courses E-G and in retrospect this was the telling factor in classes being well over time. A little could have been attributed to the heat!

In planning the courses difficulty was encountered in providing route choice in parts of the map. This was mainly due to the nature of the terrain (i.e. 7 parallel running ridges with sometimes wide valleys in between)-in some cases a lot of dead running was required when connecting ridges. Thanks go to the people who helped Rod and I in the running of the event, and to the Hawkes Bay Club for making the journey. I am sure you will agree that it was a good thing I ran into Ted at the H.B. Two day event last month. If you had bought a bus, I am sure it would still be down Penelope Road!!

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1983

Once again, I am happy to report to you that orienteering is alive and well in Hawke's Bay -if, possibly, somewhat weary as the result of two very successful events organised on behalf of the New Zealand Orienteering Federation.

The excellent support we enjoyed for both the Australasian Challenge and our Labour Weekend Two-Day events must be jointly attributable to the tremendous team effort of you, the members, in ensuring that these major events ran efficiently and to the terrific Hawkes Bay climate which our visitors experienced at last year's Gwavas badge event. This was, as you all know, repeated for the International and so the Two-Day was well supported. It now remains to be seen whether the travelling orienteering circus is still as keen on Hawkes Bay following the climatic change at that event. Entries for our Three-Day event next Queen's Birthday weekend will no doubt, in due course, tell us the answer to that one!

Getting back to your contribution to this year's orienteering, I strongly suspect that this is the true key to our success, and I am quite sure that all the meeting organisers particularly Julie and Roger, would readily agree with me. Without the teamwork involved in running a major event, there is no doubt in my mind that we would never get the show on the road- and every team needs good leadership this was obviously present at both our badge events and I know that you will join with me in expressing the club's appreciation to Roger and Julie for the hard work they both put in. Perhaps Brian's treasurer's report will indicate just how successful these events were in financial terms.

However, I will repeat my comments of last year and remind all members that our present stable financial position should not be taken as a signal to rest on our laurels. We are NOT a money-making organisation- we are a sports club and any money we accumulate should be wisely used to further that sport. In our case, as you all know, quite substantial amounts of money are required to produce new maps, and if orienteering in our area is to progress, we need to produce at least two new maps every year. Our mapping officer Ross, and his team are progressing well with the fieldwork at Maraetotara, and this area will be "christened" at the Queen's Birthday three-day. There is also another area to be mapped in the Tuki-Tuki valley, and these two could well considerably deplete our cash reserves.

On the other hand, to run orienteering events properly, the right equipment is essential, and on this score, our club is now very well set up- we have our caravan, over 100 controls and all the ancillary gear, so we should not need to spend undue amounts on equipment in the foreseeable future. Once again this is due to the many hours of hard work put in by you, the members, in this case led by equipment officer Sharon.

So, as can be seen, we have arrived at a well established position as a result of a dedicated and enthusiastic nucleus of members. However, this has had the effect of taxing, in some cases, just about all their leisure time, and as a result, a number of the committee, including myself, have decided to stand down to take a well earned break in the coming year.

To those people (as well as the ones who are offering their services yet again) I would like to offer my sincerest thanks for jobs well done. And to all those taking office this evening, I am sure that I speak for all of my colleagues when I say that we will be happy to give any assistance to you should you need it - particularly during the "settling in" period.

Most of you will recently have received copies of the Otago University questionnaire on Orienteering, and whilst some of the information sought may seem, at first glance, puzzling, I have no doubt that the information will be used intelligently. I hope that everyone who received a questionnaire filled it out, and that the net result of the study will benefit the sport.

My suggestion made in my last presidential address that if every member were to introduce at least one new member during the year the club would end this year in a more stable position has not been able to be fulfilled, since only a few new members joined.

The continued prosperity (and I use that term in sporting terms rather than financial) of the club I now believe, depends on the infusion of new blood to the sport in Hawkes Bay. If those stalwart members who are doing all the work are not relieved, orienteering will wane. Already there are once keen orienteers who are drifting away to road running and it is I believe that the pathetic coverage given to orienteering by the mass media in New Zealand, when compared with the other sports - some of which have no larger following - must be held largely responsible. For some reason it would seem desirable to televise several days of events such as the Dulux cycle race or the Motogard Rally - both of which have a lot less starters than the National Orienteering Champs - and yet we are not even favoured with so much as the reading of the results. Has anyone seen orienteering on T.V.? It is my firm opinion that, until the NZOF comes up with a way to make our sport appealing to TV sports producers, orienteering will simply be a strange enigma to 99% of the population. Maybe APOC will be considered worth a mention.

Finally, it is, once again, my very enjoyable duty to present the Mook Cup. Before doing so I will ask Ted to read the nominations. Your committee had quite some difficulty deciding since all those nominated were well deserving of the honour. However, there can only be one winner and so I would ask Ross Frechtling to come forward and accept the cup.

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#### THE HEATHER MARDON TROPHY

THIS WAS made by Heather as a Woodwork project, and it is to be presented to the female member of the club who has done well in the sport. This year it is awarded to Fiona Crawford, following her selection for the New Zealand team to compete at A.P.O.C. in January.
