NZOF BADGE AWARD SCHEME



Four levels of badges are awarded by the New Zealand Orienteering Federation, - Gold, Silver, Bronze and Iron. Any orienteer affiliated to the NZOF can obtain credits toward a badge, by competing in the events nominated as Badge Events.

All financial members of a Club are automatically affiliated to the NZOF.

TO qualify for a badge you must obtain three credits at the same level or higher and they must be earned within a three year period. Credits obtained in a higher grade may be used towards a badge in a lower grade. Credits gained by Juniors in their first year in a new grade may be used to complete an award in their previous grade.

There is no distinction between E, A, B and C grades for badge purposes, i.e., a silver credit from W21B can be used with two silver credits from W21A to claim a W21 silver badge.

A base time is calculated in each grade by taking the average of the first two placed NZOF members, unless there are less than five competitors, in which case the winners time is taken as the base time. Qualifying times for each badge level are then calculated as follows:-

Gold Badge:	A Grade	-	Base time plus 12.5%
Silver Badge:	A Grade	-	Base time plus 25%
	B Grade	-	Base time plus 12.5%
Bronze Badge:	A Grade	-	Base time plus 37.5%
	B Grade	-	Base time plus 25%
Iron Badge:	Three completed badge events.

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HINTS FOR BEGINNERS .. ..

1. Before you start, study map and legend. Discover what is high, what is low, what is a fence, a track, a stream, a hill or a valley.
2. Attach your compass to your wrist and stick or staple the control card and clue descriptions to your map. Put it all into a plastic bag. (If you prefer to carry your control card separate check that you have it at ALL times. Lost control cards are very frustrating to say the least.)
3. Visit the controls in order, except when it is a score event.
4. A golden rule - KEEP THE MAP ORIENTATED. That means holding it the way you are going, or always keeping the magnetic north lines pointing north. What you see on the map will then be what you see on the ground in front of you....check the features off as you go.
5. Check with the control descriptions that you have found the correct control with the right number or letter on it. Only then should you clip your control card.
6. Clip in the correct box - ONCE and HARD. Each clipper has a different pattern of holes - having two or three goes at clipping only produces a jumble. If you do make a mistake, punch correctly in one of the spare boxes AND tell the finish official.
7. Don't take any notice of anyone else - they may be going the wrong way or may be on a different course.
8. ALWAYS REPORT TO THE FINISH whether you have finished the course or not. All starters are checked with finish cards to ensure that no one is lost. The officials will not be happy sending a search party to look for someone who has already packed up and gone home !

## WHAT TO DO IF YOU CANNOT FIND YOUR CONTROL

1. Don't panic. Stop and think.
2. Do not run up and down aimlessly, hoping the control will appear.
3. Head for the nearest known feature - a hill, a track, large depression etc. Or re-trace your steps until you reach a known position.
4. If necessary, other people can be asked where you are, but don't ask where the control is.
5. If you are really desperate, stay by a control until someone comes along. Tell them to send someone back to you after they have finished.
6. The most important thing is to KEEP CALM. THINK.

N.B. The centre of the circle shows the position of the control. It pays to take extra care when copying the circles onto your map from the master maps. Look at the clue description first. It will give you a better idea of where to position the centre. An extra minute spent here, may save you many minutes on the course.


THE CLIPPER CHALLENGE TROPHY

A trophy to be called the "Clipper Challenge Trophy " has been presented by a Club member. The purpose of the trophy is to encourage competition by Club members at a National level.

Points will be awarded to Club members who compete at events which carry NEOF Badge Event status.

The Trophy is to be awarded annually for the period 1 January to 31 December and began on 1 January this year.

Points are to be calculated according to the persons performance in their own grade. These grades can be either A, B or C. For those competing in B & C grades, credit awards will be calculated to give Gold, Silver and Bronze status as with A Grades. Points will be accumulated over the 12month period and will be gained as follows:-

## EASTER 3-DAY 1985 !!

SATURDAY APRIL 6th TO MONDAY APRIL 8TH 1985

That's right, plans are already under way for next year's Easter 3-day. The venue chosen for this magnificent occasion is Mangawhai Forest, about 110km north of Auckland.

The forest is ideal for all those travelling to the World Championships and the Australia-New Zealand Challenge in Australia later in the year, and will be used for trial purposes for these NZ teams (we hope!). The terrain is based on intricate reclaimed sand dunes with large areas of eucalyptus plantings duplicating Australian forest conditions. (Forest is now out-of-bounds for all orienteers until Easter 1985).

The forest area is bordered by white sand beaches offering good swimming, surfing and fishing. The forest backs on to a freshwater trout fishing lake for the enthusiasts. In Mangawhai, many recreational facilities exist - golf, tennis, canoeing - and there are a number of marked walks nearby.

Accommodation is reasonable in the area, with motels and hotels at Wellsford, Kaiwaka, Brynderwyn, Waipu and Mangawhai Heads. It should be noted, however, that the area is very popular during the Easter period (due to the excellent climate), so anybody who wants this sort of accommodation should be in quick (it would also help to stimulate local interest and aid our sponsorship efforts). There are also three camping grounds at Mangawhai, offering limited cabin facilities and plenty of tent sites. The organisers intend to be able to block book tent sites. School facilities may also be available.

So, once again, the NWOC cordially invites all orienteers to spend next Easter up in the 'winterless north'. Come on up and help in spreading the 'O' word in Northland!
