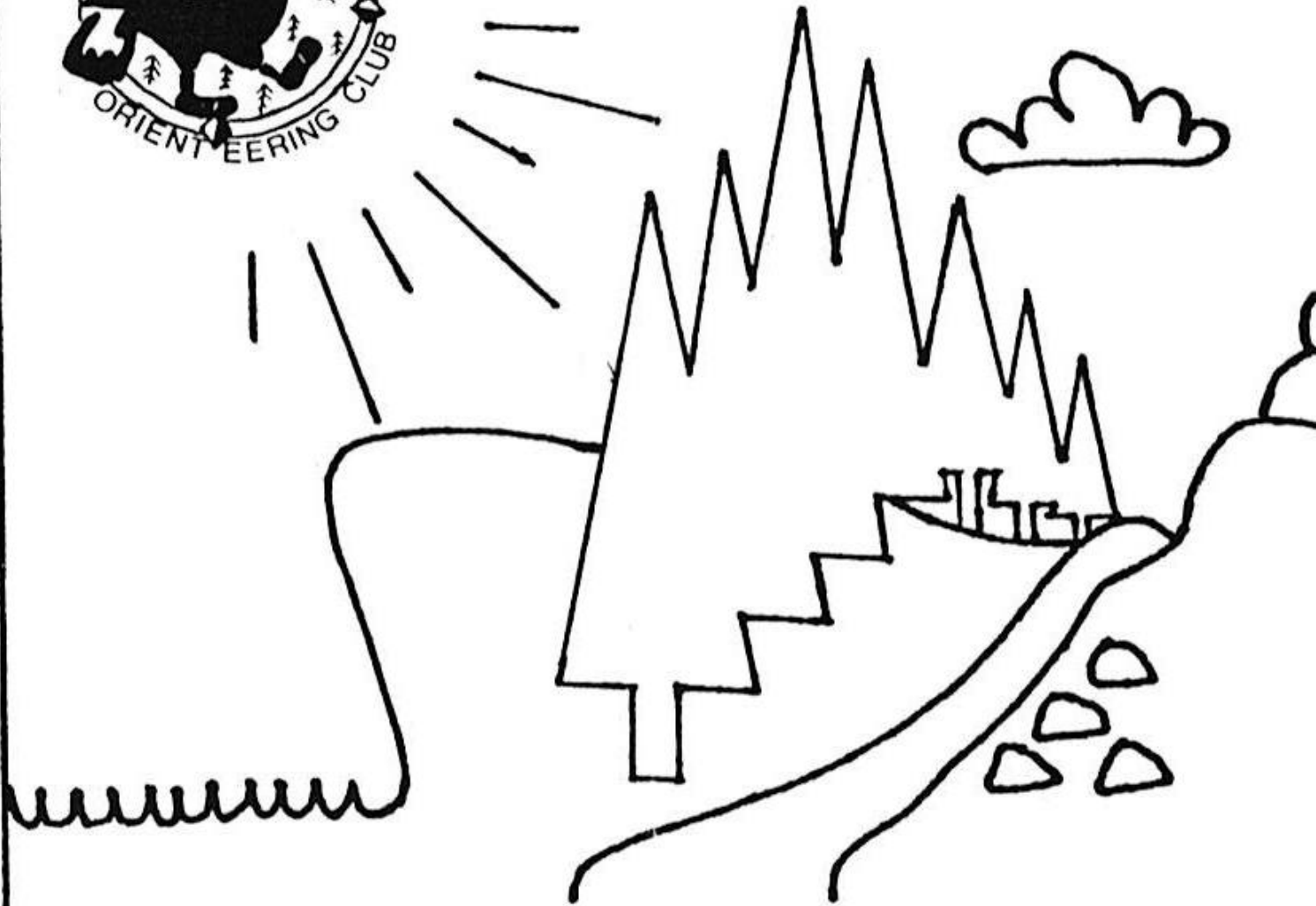

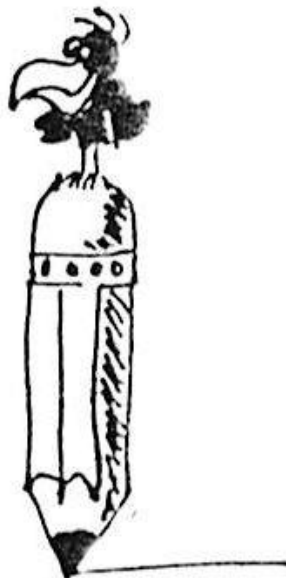
Thank you contributors in this edition - your articles make interesting reading.
