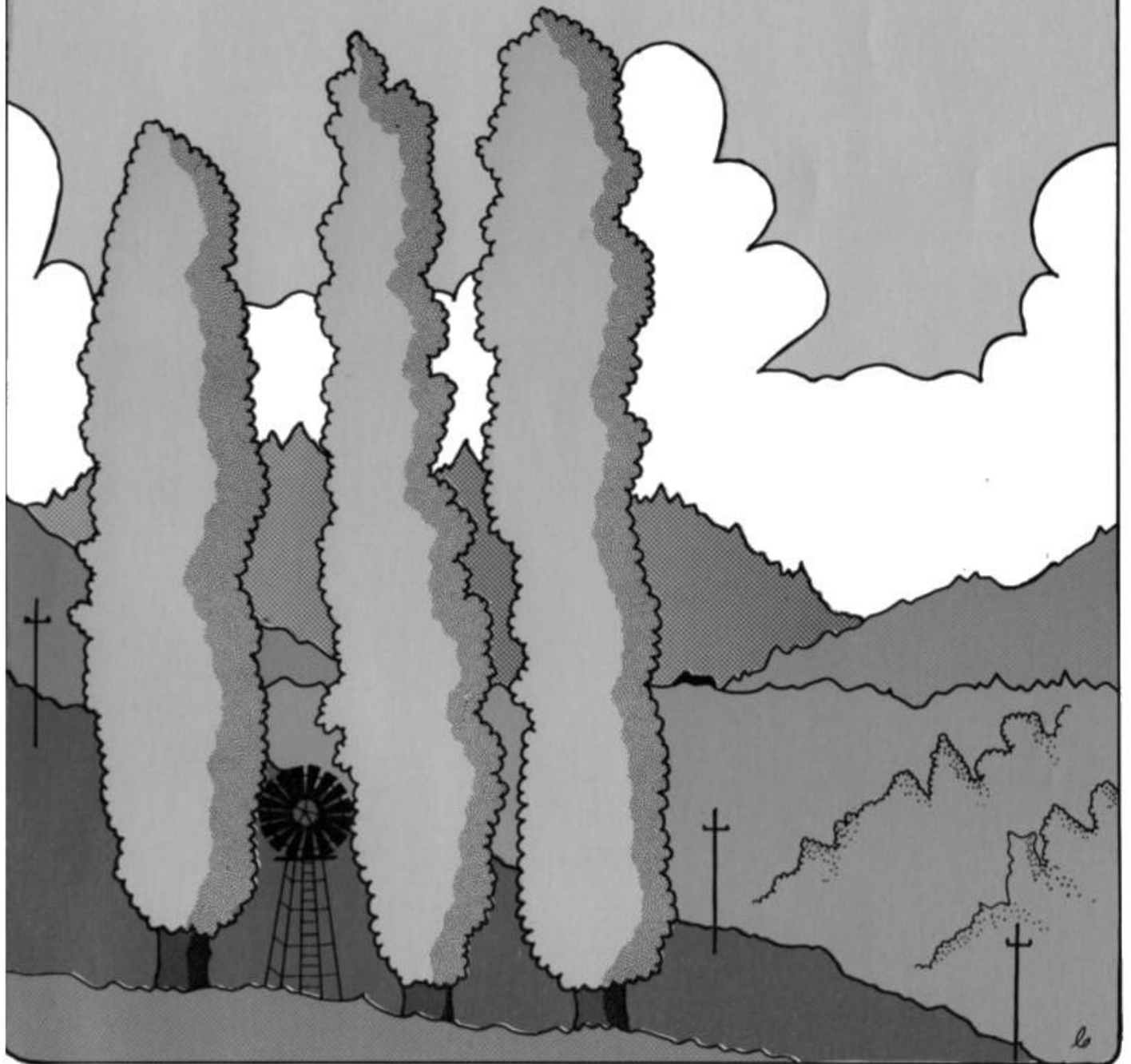

AROUND THE MOUNTAINS RELAY

I had heard about this relay from Graham Teahen two years ago and at the beginning of the year I managed to track down an entry form. Ted Sapsford independently had also managed to secure an entry form.

Organising 10 people to be at the same place at the same time is not a job for the faint hearted. After a series of major and minor problems and Bruce Perry's ankle injury, 9 of us set off to Waiouru together with our manager Vicki Van Veen. We hired a Mini Van for the event and I believe this is the only way.

We arrived at 9.00 pm on Friday night to find total chaos and no Roger. Army instructions were incomplete and we ended up at the swimming pool for our accommodation. Our second leg runner, David Van der Peet went to sleep with the thought he might have to run the first two legs [20 miles] but fortunately Roger Munday found us at 4.00 am on Saturday morning.

Each of us was supposed to run 10 miles [16 kms] but as Bruce Perry was missing we had to share the fifth leg.

Roger set off in the dark at 5.00 am and the start gun was an artillery piece which gave everyone a heart attack. By the third leg the various team competitors T-shirts were becoming obvious and mean't that we could see how we were going. Gerard passed the "cracking the ton" team and we jostled with them for the rest of the journey.

Bruce's leg was after my leg but the previous few hill climbs mean't that I was in no condition to continue and so Gerard took over. David Van der Peet and I finished the leg off and I was embarrassed to be congratulated for my good run.

James and Paul carried on the good work for the sixth and seventh legs while the rest of us started on the refreshments. At the start of the eighth leg Russell was two minutes down on the "cracking the ton" team and we told him to clean him up. That didn't prove particularly difficult as Russell had passed him after 6 kms and went on to record the fastest time of our team at 1 hour 27 seconds for the 16 kms.

Stewart then took over and we stopped off at Ohakune to restock the 'steinee' cans. David Van der Peet then showed his song writing talents while we watched Trevor wilt in the heat.

The relay was very enjoyable, however, the after match function left a lot to be desired and we could not see where the \$12,000

D.B. Sponsorship had gone. Most of the function was spent queuing for food and the D.B. cans were sold at \$1.50 per can.

Paul Jarvis did an excellent job as our driver while the rest of us relaxed in the back.

ROAD RUNNING

Wanganui

RECORDS were broken in five grades in the 100-mile New Zealand Army DB Draught Round the Mountains Relay in the Tongariro National Park on Saturday.

A total of 211 teams, involving 2206 competitors, battled strong winds while a fire raged in National Park to set record times in the open, men's, women's, veterans' and composite grades.

Winner of the open grade were Wellington Harriers in 9hr 21min 58s.

The other record-breaking teams were the Tiger Balm Road team of YMCA (Auckland) in the verterans', Wanganui Police, Scottish (Wellington) in the women's, DB Kia Toa (Palmerston North) in the men's, and the Vintage Veterans (Napier) in the 2x50 miles.

"McNEIL" 13th November 88

For a month while H.B. farmers prayed for rain, we had our fingers crossed that it wouldn't! We had decided to use the southern end of the map as it had been virtually untouched by the Easter 3 Day and if it had rained it is doubtful that we could have got cars to the starting point.

We set the course using the map with fences and were a little worried that they looked too easy but once transferred to the map without the fences they took on a very different look. We set one leg of the A course across the gorge giving the route choice of going either side of it and it was interesting to find afterwards that all competitors had taken the left side option! which had a more open but steeper run.

The controls were put in place the day before the event. The large number of goats in some areas caused us concern and we checked some controls the next day in case the flags had become goat fodder, however none had been eaten but cattle had knocked several over.

Initially we were rather skeptical about the area but after having had an intimate look over a large proportion of the map we now believe it has a lot of potential for future events. The north-western portion with its partial covering of mature trees is particularly challenging. McNeil is certainly a very useful addition to this Club's very varied array of mapped terrain and it will offer a challenge to club members for a long time to come.

Thanks to all those who came and we hope you enjoyed the courses we set. A special thanks to Dave Fisher who helped to get in controls. It was especially appreciated after a long, hot day!

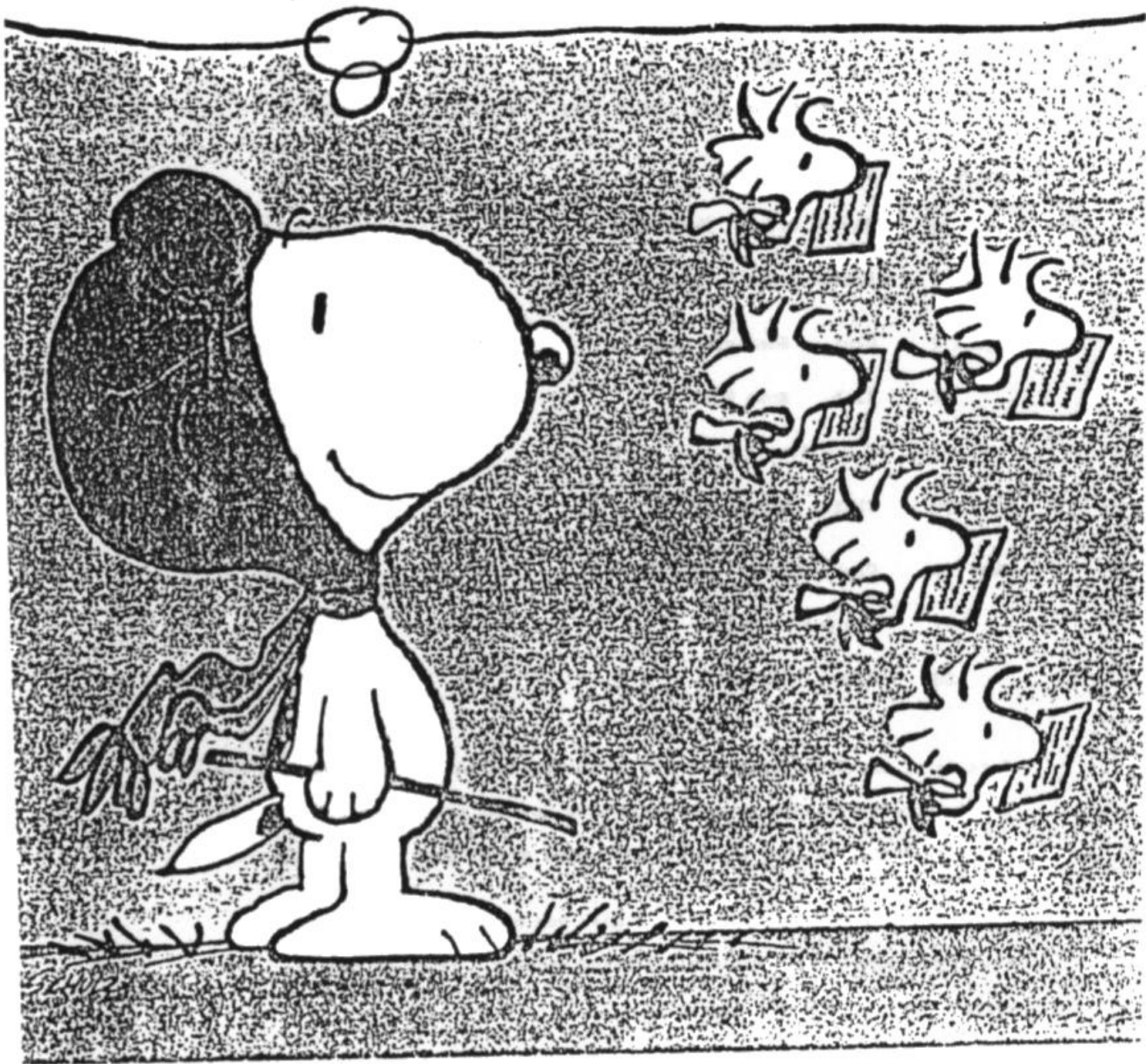
