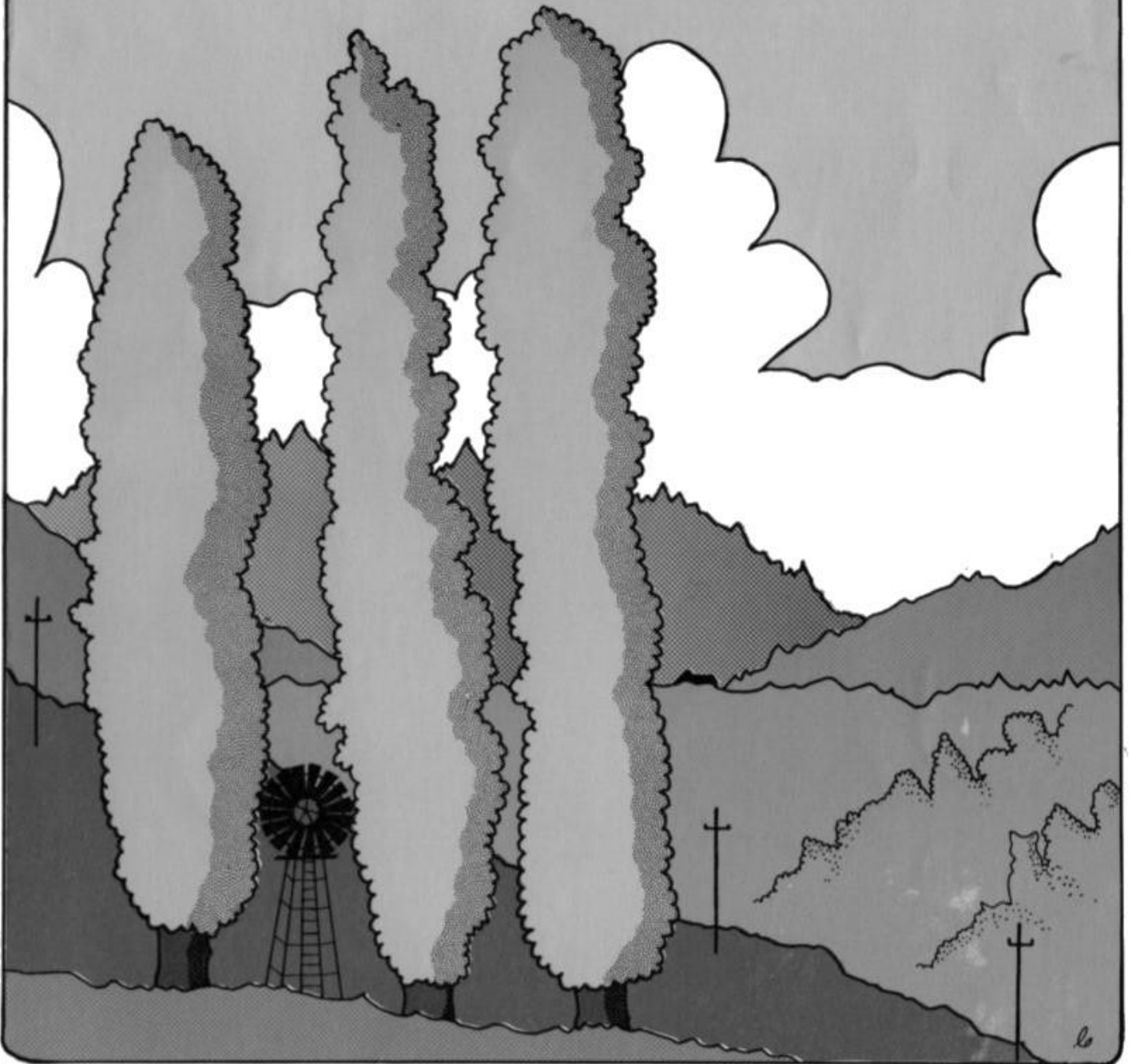

2. Due to the cancellation of the 1990 Mountain Marathon and the difficulty in obtaining permission for our 1992 Mountain Marathon, Ted is considering the idea of running a 24-hour Mini Mountain Marathon on the same lines as the South Island TWALK.

There is no truth in the rumour that Ted was underwhelmed by the comments by Paul Dalton in respect of the running of our very successful 1988 Ruahine Macpac Mountain Marathon.

3. The HB Orienteering Club have tendered to deliver phone books in the Waipukurau/Waipawa areas. If successful we will need the support of our club members. It is intended to hold a street event after delivering the phone books.

4. A 7-Day event is mooted for late December 1991/early Jan 1992 (we really plan ahead in this sport), with Wairarapa, Red Kiwis, Kapiti Havoc, Hutt Valley, Wellington, Egmont and good old Hawkes Bay each providing a new map of an area not used before. We are asked to provide one with rocks. Granules is famous!!

If the previous two 7-Days are anything to go by the attendance will be big. 500 in May 1986 and 800 in January 1989. Overseas orienteers combine them with world trips.

Mangarara fieldworkers comments: The organisers of the 7-Day do not consider our 'Mangarara' map new enough which will mean we will be able to enjoy ourselves at the 7-Day without the necessity of organising an event unless of course Brian is keen.

5. Winter Classic Competition

The Wairarapa Club has invited us to a 'Winter Classic' event to be held next Sunday, 16 July. Full details available from Stewart. Signposted from Masterton.

6. We applied to run a 3-Day Badge Event in 1990 over the Queen's Birthday weekend. The suggestion was to use Mangarara for two days and Smedley for one. Alas we were unsuccessful.

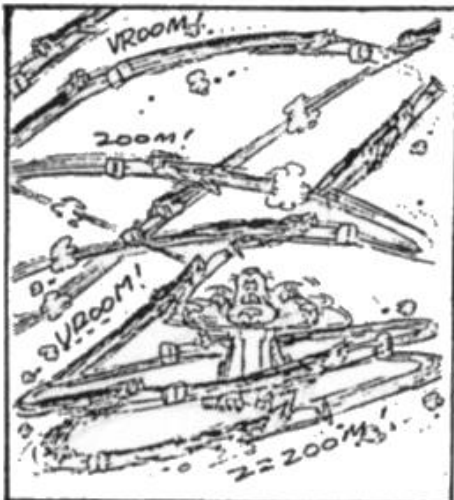

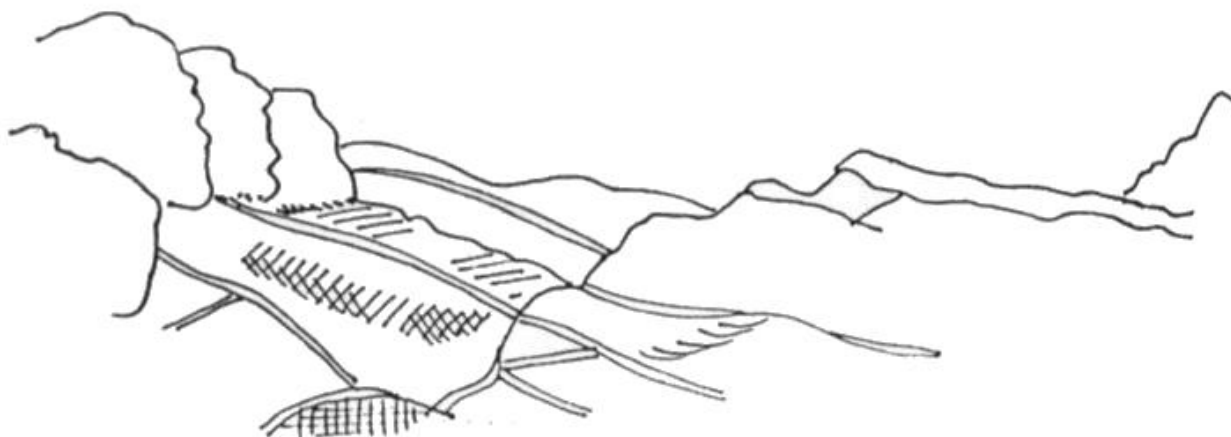
I'm afraid I remember even less about this event but here goes.

This was the inaugural Tower Trust Triple Peaks Challenge. I am still not really sure who Tower Trust are mainly because I have'nt bothered to read all the investment blurb they sent out with the results. Anyway they ran an excellent event even if some people did get lost through not following the numerous markers put there to guide them. The event was run by either individuals or in a relay team of three, over the peaks of Mt Erin, Kahuranaki and Te Mata. For the event Peter, Maurice and myself formed a team. Maurice ran the first leg over Mt Erin and then continued to run the next two legs as an individual runner. I ran or at times crawled up and over Kahuranaki, then down a ridge through the Raretu map to the second change over. Peter ran the third leg up and over Te Mata Peak and then down to finish outside the Happy Tav in Havelock North.

Our team completed the event in a time of four hours, fourteen minutes and 43 seconds. Maurice did an excellent individual time for the course in just under four hours 30 minutes.

The organisers are hoping to run the event again next year and I can recommend it as a great way of seeing the Hawkes Bay countryside. The beer and the sausages at the Happy Tav afterwards tasted good too.

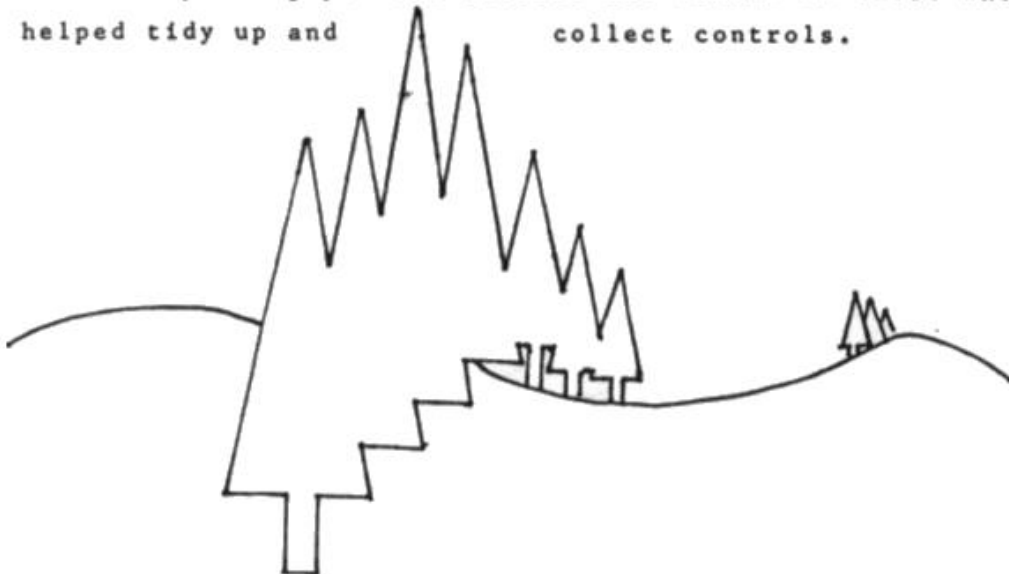

EVENT ORGANISERS - Lois & Rob Nairn - Catherine & Wayne Lee

In orienteering terms this map has many pros and cons. To present a challenge to participants, especially in respect of our more accomplished orienteers, it is necessary to take some licence when placing the controls. Many might describe it as hiding or concealing. We prefer to think of it as 'Creative Placement'.

We had grave doubts the week before the event, as to the sort of turnout we were going to get as many of the 'regulars' had indicated that they might not be along.

We were, as a consequence, more than pleasantly surprised when we ended up with over 35 participants and many of those were groups. Many new or near new people turned up and because courses were generally not too hard or steep, the parting comment from most was 'See you at Rowe Road'.

Strictly as a personal comment, I see numbers at events appearing to decline slightly especially from the ranks of our better performers and new memberships being accumulated only slowly.

The solution might be more events such as the one we have just run. Easy running and close to town. Even in the face of less than usual press advertising we were delighted with the numbers of first time participants we attracted. Amongst these people there may be another Bruce Perry, Peter Watson, Caroline Watson or Stewart Hyslop and if not quality orienteers such as these perhaps plodders such as me who at least achieve quantity of orienteering rather than quality.

T W A L K 1 9 8 9

Doug and I were keen to redeem our mediocre performance in TWALK (24 Hour walk) 1988, but not at the expense of doing any training.

The event is based on completing a series of sections which revolve around a central point, 'the hash house'. The pre-event conversation revolved around who was going to clean up the event. Naturally enough we did not enter into contention. We knew who was expected to win (and they did) and we decided to give them a wind up in the first leg.

We were dropped off 14km from the hash house and expected to find ten ice cream container lids with words printed on. To do this we were given clues and grid references.

The event started at 11.00am and would finish at 11.00am the next day (plus two hours walking-in time if required). We led into the first control and much to our surprise the next team was 400 metres behind so we ran the first leg in race mode despite having 24 hours to go. We completed the first leg in 2:09 minutes and led by 20 minutes.

After a compulsory 30 minutes stand-down period we were into the second section which was 12km long. The second section went OK and so did the third section of 12km. Darkness fell half way around the third section and we started on section four at 8.15pm.

This section proved our downfall as fatigue created basic errors in judgement which meant the 14km course took us 8½ hours. To illustrate how the mind works at 1am in the morning, one of the clues was 'trough'. We spent an hour going back and forth over two non-ridges until we finally worked out the trough was on the third ridge. Once we were on the correct ridge we discovered a 'trough' very quickly but no 'word'. After spending another hour marching up and down the ridge and just about ready to give up in frustration we decided to have another look at the trough. Walking down the electric fence to the trough we discovered another trough five metres to the

left. To add insult to injury I got an electric shock climbing over the fence to record the 'ward'.

The fifth leg went brilliantly until the third control where we convinced ourselves, three quarters of the way to the control, that we were lost and consequently we had to wait until daylight to find out where we were. Our perseverance allowed us to continue and at 10.52am we found the eighth control on section five.

It took us just under two hours to walk the seven kilometres back to the hash house, but finding that last control was worth it as it improved our placing to third (50 controls). The second placegetters found 52 and the winners 57.

We would like to thank Ross Wakelin, Peter Squires and their team for organising the event and hope they can enter our event.

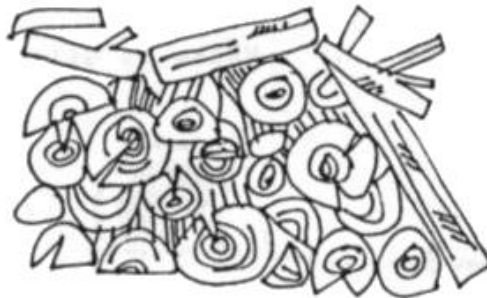

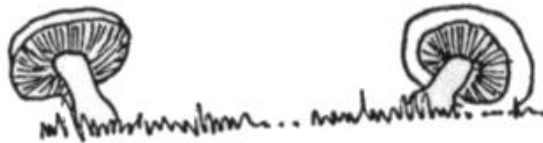

I first got involved with Kiwisport orienteering while teaching at Springhill School. I was asked to organise orienteering as part of several Kiwisport activities for a rural activity day involving Springhill, Sherwood and Onga Onga Schools. Luckily I'd done some orienteering with my own class (5-9 year olds) and had had the school mapped (thanks to Bruce).



Bruce and I planned four courses - a short, two mediums and a long. The unknown factor was how long the children would take to complete a course. After explaining to them how to go about it, I sent the children off on their courses according to age which ranged from 8-13 years. Some children picked it up very quickly and managed to complete all four courses in the half hour but some of the younger children needed individual help. All the children thoroughly enjoyed themselves and orienteering was the most popular sport of the day with those unable to try it wanting to know when they'd get the chance.

I have since organised orienteering afternoons at Tikokino and Omakere Schools. In both cases the teachers supplied the maps and I planned the courses. I unintentionally made one course at Omakere more difficult than planned by forgetting to put a control out.

Kiwisport orienteering is becoming popular in CHB with an afternoon planned for Springhill and Sherwood Schools, and Waipawa School has also expressed an interest. The children are really enthusiastic about it which bodes well for the future of the sport.



SOCIAL EVENING 20 MAY 89  
 SUPER STRIKE TEN PIN BOWLING

After this event I was considering retiring from my position of social functions organiser. The reason being I felt that the organisation I put into each evening is taken for granted. 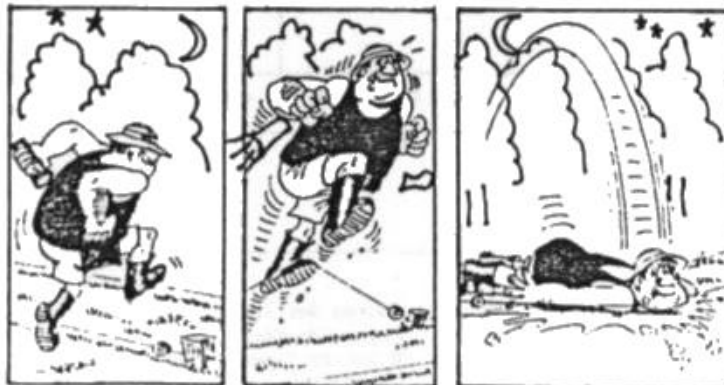
