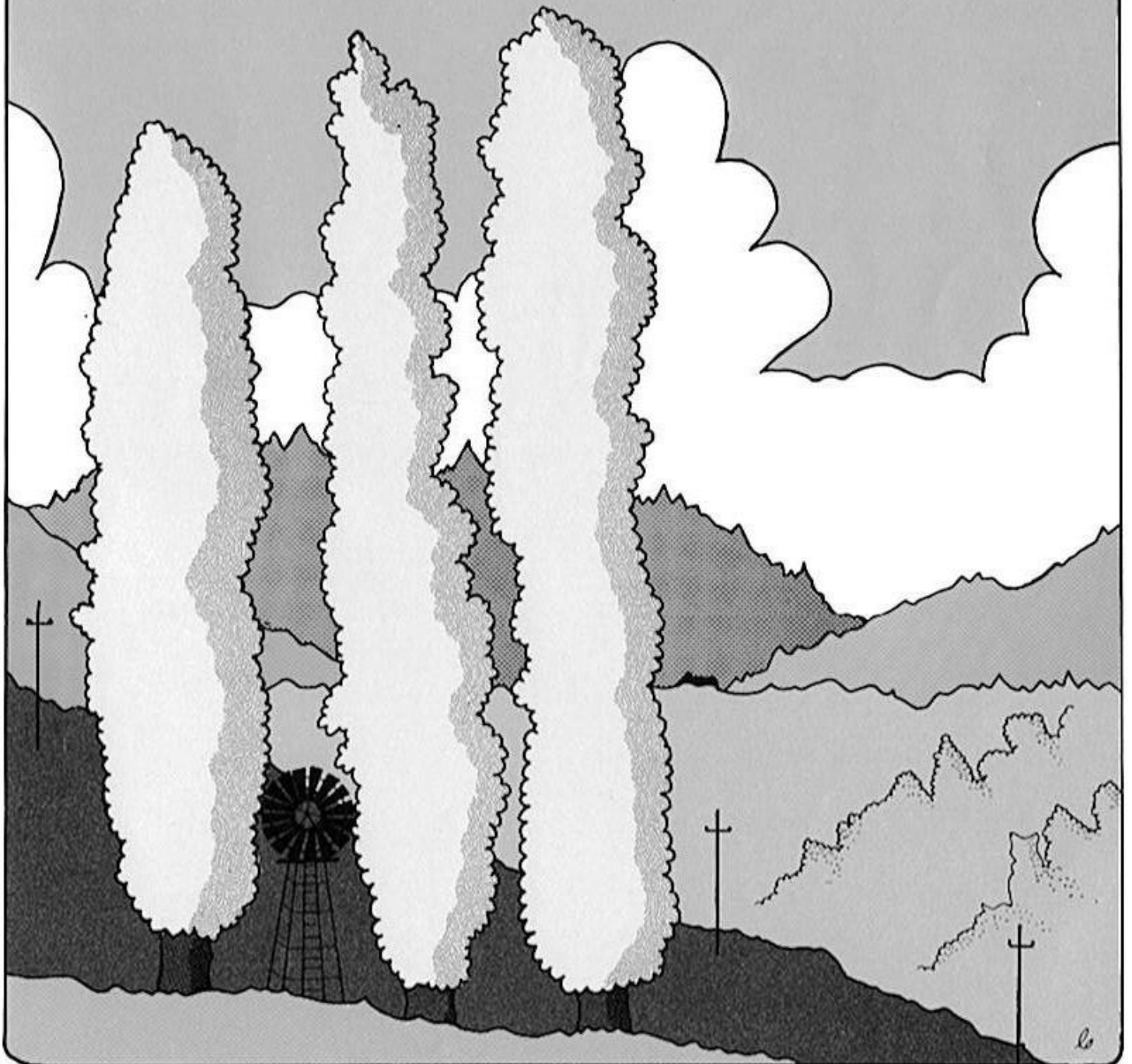

In 1992, I started to get the feel of Smedley when I set the first Long-0. Using the experience and knowledge of the area I felt able to produce better courses for 1993. This year's courses were longer and used most of Smedley Station's 3418 hectares. It still took 11 days in the field to set the control sites and update the many tracks and dams that just kept on appearing.

Settling the courses and they being practical are two different things so I still had to check out the more likely routes to ensure they were feasible. This entailed getting into some interesting places. I reached the highest point in Smedley and was able to look north along the Wakarara Range as opposed to always looking up at them. I got into what must be the deepest gorge, sheer black granite walls rising straight up to a narrow slit of blue sky, it was quite awe inspiring. I stumbled into a lovely river flat hidden by massive cliffs. It was like something out of fairyland. A grassy meadow, speckled with spring flowers and sparkling streams, wending their way to the quiet pools of the Makaroro River. The whole area was dominated by great old native trees. A magic place I left with the utmost reluctance. On another occasion I decided that the quickest way from a high ridge to a stream below would be the direct route. As I fought my way through manuka held together with bush lawyer, I revised my original decision, too late by that time. A 140 metre descent took over an hour.

The event itself. Low entries, 25 to be exact, but as some entries formed teams of 2 the competitor count must have been 30 people. It was good to see Andrew Dunbar and Ben Lee out there giving their fathers some much needed moral support - I doubt if they could have hacked it without the lads. Both boys finished like seasoned mountain marathoners. The weather was wet but mild, cooler on the tops with poor visibility.

The success of the event was directly attributable to:

Doug Matheson and Peter Hill for setting the Saturday courses on the Smedley O map.

David Fisher whose Suzuki van goes boldly where sane man has not walked before. Dave spent 2 days ferrying me all over Smedley putting out controls and being a manned control on Sunday. Over the 3 days Dave did a minimum of 110km over the station. He also did all the paper work, entries, correspondence and putting up with me.

Denise Santo and Bill Walch for the Saturday evening and Sunday morning catering. If a soldier marches on his stomach, orienteers must run on theirs. The standard produced by mine hosts surely gave these orienteers the capability to fly.

Kath Berry and Anne Sapsford for organising a brilliant finish routine. Recording finish times and preparing an after race warm up of hot showers, soup and sausages, sometimes the sequence differed.

Last but not least, Jerry Jeromson, the manager of Smedley Station gave us his total support right from the inception of the event. On the Monday after the Long-0 Jerry organised the collections of our controls and that was a major job in itself.

That was the Smedley Long-0 for 1993.

SMEDLEY MEDLEY - 1993

"Memoirs of a Masochist"

Tough enough healing the physical and mental wounds without Ted's 'phone call asking for a review of the event from a competitor's viewpoint.

Question : Which viewpoint does Ted want?

The one surrounded by sodden scrub, in the middle of a low cloud trying to locate the end of that elusive track?.... Or stuck halfway up the slippery unmarked waterfall unsure whether the risk to life and limb was greater ascending or descending?.... Or surrounded by blackberry having taken a short-cut through the gorge?

Anyway, why did Ted ask me? All of the Course B and C people had finished long before I caught that welcome glimpse of the shearers' quarters through the mist and murk. And apart from the mysterious antics of the DNF Mardons. I didn't get to hear of the hard luck stories either. Furthermore, from Control 10 to the end (2-1/2 hours) I didn't see or hear any other living creature to report on, save the Smedley stock and the odd rabbit and turkey. It was lonely out there!

Having spelt out the inadequacy of any credentials, I shall pass a few comments on the second Smedley Medley.

There were a few changes from 1992. For one, I spent Saturday night in the luxury of a warm bed at home far from the communal living at the Baker's Block shearers quarters which were chosen as the start/finish point this year. In addition, Ted had quietly added 4 kilometres (as the crow flies) to the length (probably double that on the ground) and 460 metres more climb. In fact, we were to do 2000 metres of climb by the optimal route (not that far short of Ruapheu, Egmont and Ngauruhoe but more than Tongariro and the rest of the North Island mountain ranges!) No wonder Dave and Ted looked smug as banter was exchanged during the briefing.

It was a little disappointing that only 6 had entered the long course after the time put in by the setters. Neil Mora downgraded to the Short Course having shot round the Hamilton marathon the week before in 3 hours 1 minute = a wise decision in hindsight.

Two unknowns were also entered, questioning us all as to how long we expected to take. Based on 1992 times our estimates were rather optimistic! Neither completed the course and did not even check in at the manned control (as instructed at the briefing). Dave and Doug might still be out there waiting had they been a little more conscientious.

That left three, Peter W, myself and that doyen of orienteers, Michael Wood, who had finished a comfortable 3rd in 1992.

Peter led away with great gusto into number 1. We encountered the first gorge on leg 2 and the two of us were together at that point. Route choices differed on 3 and Pete picked up 5 minutes and I had the company of Michael Wood through from 3 to 4. We followed the stream, but neither of us could climb the waterfall, so had to backtrack and detour.

Michael took a different route to 5 (slower as it transpired) and I caught sight of Peter again, finally catching him at control 7. We found 8 together and then went our different directions again. Climb and more climb! Wet bracken, low slung scrub and no visibility as the cloud lowered (or we got higher). I must have been within 50 metres of the track before deciding to bail out and take the long way round (an extra 2 kilometres). Cost at least half an hour and spirits flagged. However, as I closed in on 9, Michael Wood could be seen on the other side of the stream. Then, amazingly, Peter was leaving the control just as I spotted it! Dave and Doug had a drink there for us and words of encouragement/abuse - I can't remember which.

As we laboured up the inevitable hill following, it was almost with disappointment that both Peter and I realised we were in competitive mode again requiring a redoubling effort. Down a stream to 10, then halfway to 11 we chose different routes again. Little did I realise, as I watched Peter careering down the hill, that that would be the last I would see of him that day! Evidently he saw me clip number 11 from the other side of the stream. Having clipped 11 Peter selected the better route to 12 but the execution left a little to be desired. Having gone round in a circle he came out of the stream the same way he went in and took another hour to relocate to number 11 again! Meanwhile, I had battled on, seeing the occasional footprint, and completely unsure whether Peter or Michael or both were ahead. Eventually, despite dehydration starting to creep in, the sanctuary of the Baker's Block buildings was regained, with the patient group of onlookers giving much needed encouragement over those final few metres.

Where were the others? My question met with the surprising answer that I was first back despite taking nearly 7 hours. Michael loped in about half an hour later (having not found number 8 as it transpired) and Peter kept everyone waiting till half past 5.

I don't know why we ever enter these sorts of events. Perhaps only because we can't let Ted believe he can beat us!

He didn't, but this course was far more testing than in 1992 and, as such, extremely satisfying to complete. Thank you Ted, and all those who assisted in running the event.

By the way, one thing was the same as in 1992 - the weather! I am sure Ted could command a handsome fee if the Egyptians ever decide to farm the Sahara. Is he descended from a long line of Aboriginal rainmakers? Or was the weather part of the Sapsford masterplan?

**HAWKE'S BAY IS THE TOP CLUB IN NEW ZEALAND!**

Modesty has prevented us from saying so ourselves but we now have the official word from the Auckland Central Club, no less. John Powell of Central did an analysis of the results of the New Zealand Championships, held at Woodhill over Labour Weekend. He was trying to find a measure of club performance, in a way that would not be biased by total membership numbers. He only used the results from those members gaining better than an Iron badge, (which everyone gets for just finishing). He did this to eliminate the bias against the Auckland clubs that may have arisen because only the "creme de la creme" (that's us!) from the distant clubs would have been prepared to travel to Auckland. John prepared a table showing how many members from each club had come in first, second and so on in their respective events. The Total row shows how many members in each club produced gold, silver or bronze performances. The Average row at the foot of the table is found by multiplying 1 x 2, plus 2 x 3, etc. and dividing the total by ten. This shows that Hawke's Bay members were more likely to be found in the forefront of their respective classes than was the case with any other club.

We may not have won many of the elite grades but our littlies and B runners certainly know how to keep in front of the field. Great stuff Catherine, Ross, Tim and Rosalie, in particular.

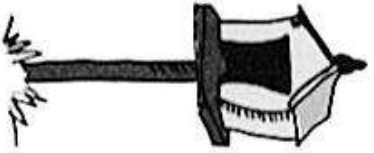
