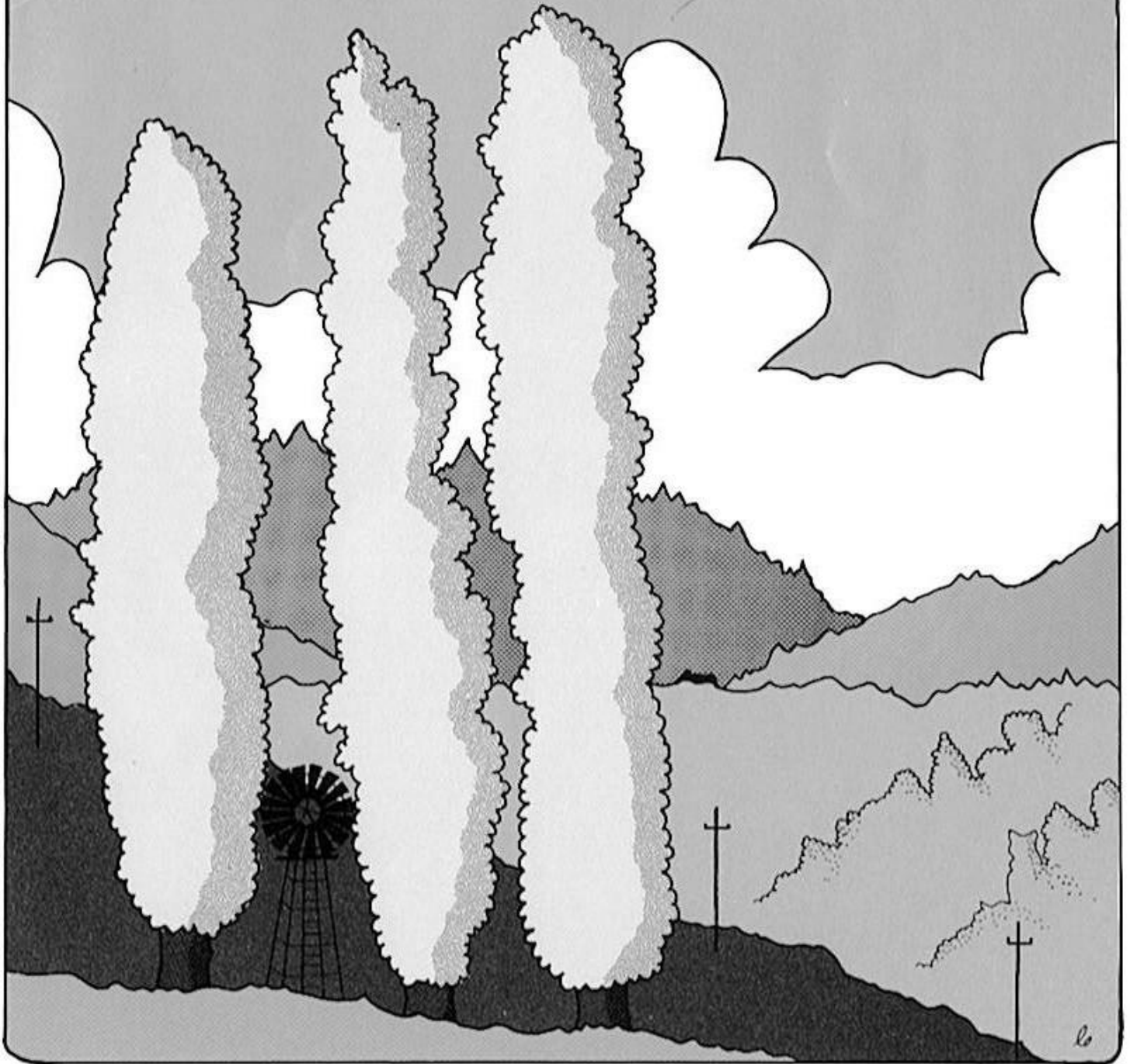

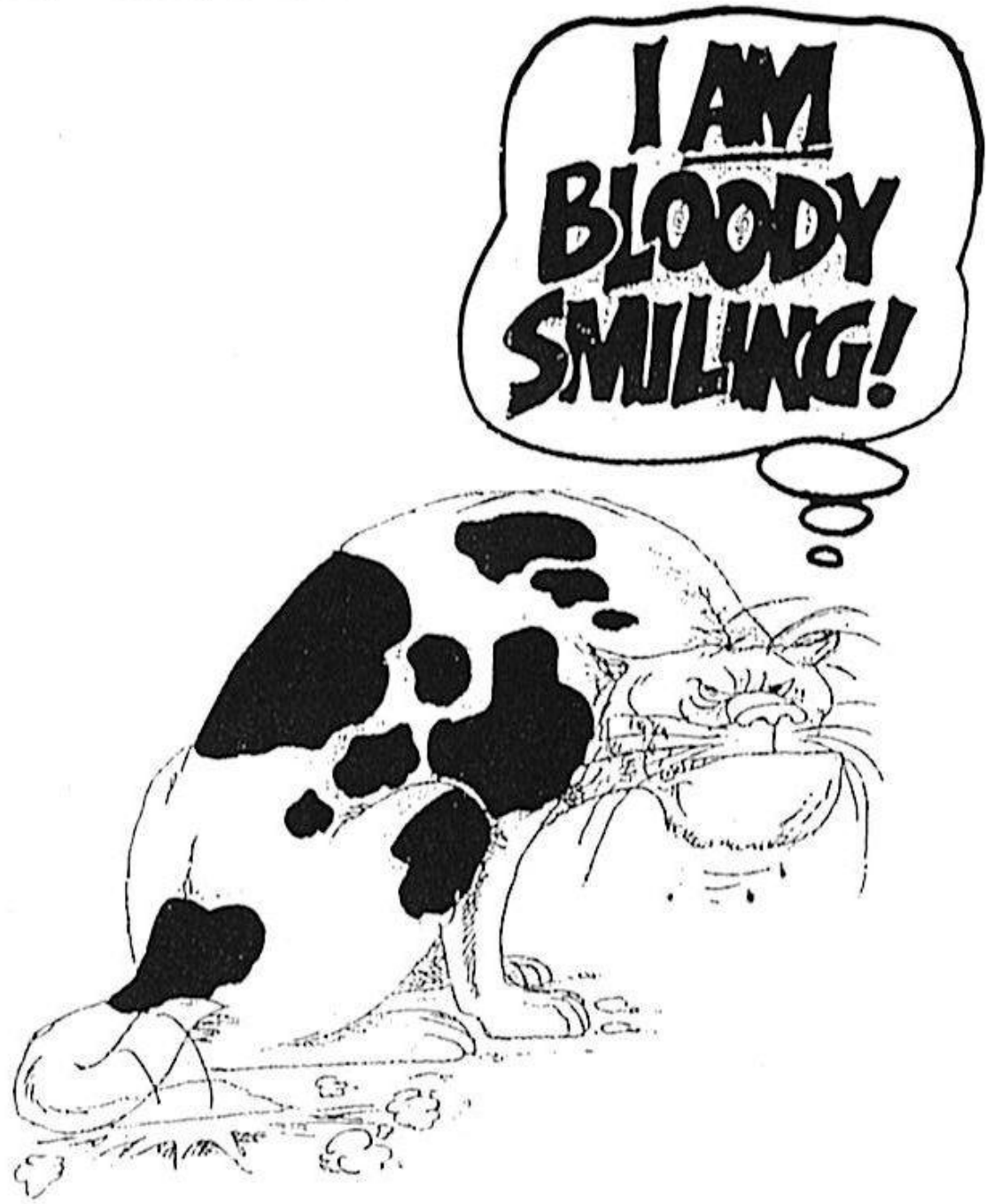

### NZ SPORTS FOUNDATION SUPPORT.



For those who have not heard or read the news in the newspapers; the NZ National Orienteering Squad received \$19,000.00 from the NZ Sports Foundation. \$9000.00 was for personal grants to Alistair Landels, Katie Fettes and Tania Robinson with the remaining \$10,000.00 to be spent on relay teams. The NZOF and the National Squad

acknowledge this welcome support of orienteering and in particular our elites. Alistair is currently in 4th place on the World Cup rankings with the final events being held through-out August and September.

## EASTER FOUR DAY AND WORLD CUP

Another opportunity to get on the road again so off we all headed for Auckland once more. Friday's event was on the Whiriwhiri map, near Waiuku, at the southern end of the Manukau Harbour. It is not often we strike a map in the Auckland area that is mainly open country but this was one, with a patch of pines and some intricate areas created by typical West Coast sand dunes. It was a beautiful day to start the weekend, although Wayne managed to do his ankle a mischief. We are very strong on sympathy and with a little technical attention as well Wayne was able to hobble around again within a couple of days.

We then moved on to a motel at Parakai, near Helensville, right in the middle of the Woodhill Forest country. Saturday was a return visit to the Kaipara Knolls map which most of us had seen last Labour Weekend for the New Zealand champs. As might have been expected though, we used another part of the map, so prior experience was of little help.

The New Zealand event in the 1994 World Cup series was run over two maps, Ngapuketurua and Pulpit Rock. Ngapuketurua is a pretty mean sort of map, much of it a delicate shade of green. Some of the World Cup courses did in fact run through native bush and scrub, which is apparently quite acceptable. Alistair Landels produced a fabulous run to head home the men's field, which included world champ Allan Morgensen of Norway. The other members of the New Zealand team, both men and women, also acquitted themselves very well. In the afternoon, it was time for lesser mortals such as us to have a run on the Ngapuketurua. And very tricky it proved to be too, mainly mature pine forest with plenty of undergrowth and a maze of intricate features. This time it was Kath's turn to do in her ankle so the weekend left the Club with a few battle scars.

The weekend was rounded off with a run on Monday on the adjoining Pulpit Rock map, a mixture of pine forest, scrub and open farmland.

## TIME TO SET AN OY?

It is quite clear from "Coming Events". Your name is down there in black and white to set the next OY, so let's get started.

The first job is to decide just where the start should be on the map - something which is very largely dictated by the availability of suitable country for the E and F courses. But once that issue is out of the way and you sit down to start planning the courses themselves, the next question is - how long?

The anticipated winning times have been set by the committee at 70 minutes for the A course, 50 minutes for the B course and 40 minutes for the C course. It is all very well to be given the estimated winning times but how do those times translate to distances on the map? Faced with this problem I went back through the OY results for the past three years and prepared a chart of course lengths and the times taken by the winners, expressed in minutes per kilometre. There is no point in everyone doing the same research when they come to set an OY so the table is set out for members' information. I hope it will be of some assistance to future OY setters and vetters.

A little caution needs to be exercised when comparing times from one year to the next as sometimes even the winners manage to get lost along the way or there is some other circumstance which gives rise to a slow winner's time. The area of a particular map that is used for a course will also influence the times.

One thing which did emerge from an examination of the times is that the A courses have been about right, with winning times not far away from 70 minutes. However, the B courses have tended to be far too long and the oldies have been really struggling to get anywhere near 50 minutes. The same applies to the C courses for the Open Women.

It is interesting to note that the A course times for Granules, Smedley, Mangaroa and The Slump are all pretty close to one another at just under 10 minutes/km. As might be expected because of the steep terrain, Seafield Road times are much slower.

These are the final results for the 1993 Clipper Challenge Cup. The idea of the Clipper Challenge was to encourage members to take part in badge events around the country. Points are allocated according to results, with gold, silver, bronze and iron badge performances being worth 10, 8, 6, 4 and 2 points respectively. The figuring is done a bit differently from the allocation of badges awarded at the events themselves as the Club recognises the best performance in a grade as being the equivalent of a gold badge time, even if the actual event may award only a silver badge because of the limited number of entries or because the member may have entered a B course.

Providence may not have been smiling on the local farmers in April and early May, but for orienteers the Autumn weather was brilliant. The Mangarara map was firm and fast (to use racing parlance), conducive to good times.

Distances were calculated to be in line with previous events at Mangarara. Electric fences were off. Even the stream was switched off, thanks to the drought. But only two courses, "B" and "F", went close to the estimated times.

Perhaps it was the heat (Chris Barnsley would say "yes") or perhaps the course setter was too tough or maybe we were all just a little bit slow!

After all the planning and fine tuning there were double disappointments for the "A" Course. First, there were only two starters and second, we boomed! Unfortunately, the second control was shown as "214" instead of "215" on the control description which naturally had Peter flummoxed, eventually returning to the start to check things out. This, no doubt, cost him valuable time and enthusiasm. However, we salute his sportmanship in neither protesting the course nor taking it out on the course setters. (At least not until the next event where Pete managed to gather 4 or 5 controls before I had reached them! \_\_DM)

The Lees were early starters and all navigated well enough to depart early too, as planned. The Berrys (Berries?) were late arriving, as planned, and even later finishing than usual. Maybe there's a message here.

Eric Dunbar took the very competitive "B" Course with minutes to spare, while Sharon Mardon made no mistakes to win the "C" Course. Ross Morrison had a comfortable margin on Course "D" and Michelle Barnsley easily won Course "E", although Quin Le Cheminant showed his promise in recording a faster time, albeit on his second run for the day. Ben Lee was fastest on the "F" Course with Quin second.

Despite the super weather only 34 people started, which was a pity. Most seemed to enjoy the change of scenery and the variety of terrain the map offered. Excepting Charles Martin who obviously wasn't satisfied with the map at all, and chose to extend his ramblings beyond its boundaries. Charles certainly got best value for his entry fee with over four hours of exercise.

As setters we learnt that we shouldn't use a vegetation boundary if no dotted line is shown on the map, and "on top of" a spur is also a "no-no". It is also useful to show the correct control number on the control description!

Ken Holst found us by chance (thereby spoiling his trip to the beach) and helped bring in controls. Thanks, too, to all the others who assisted \_\_ Tim, Brian, Bruce and Dave Fisher to name a few.

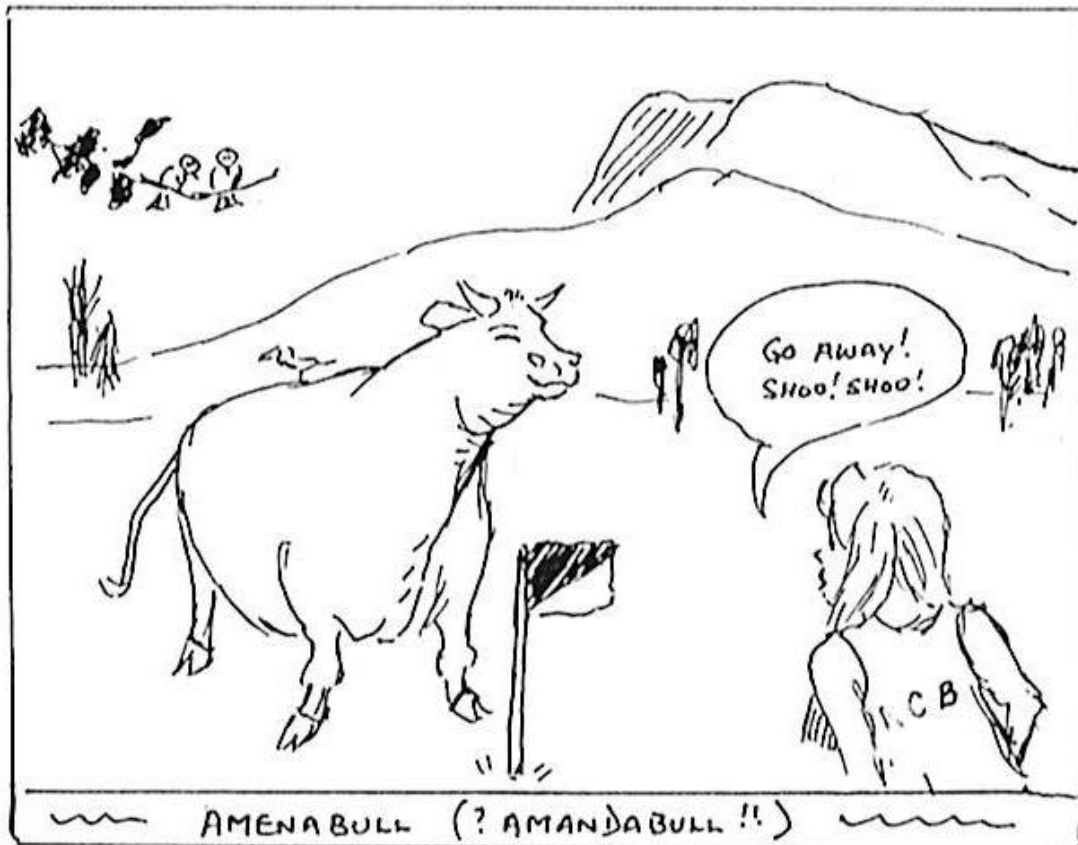

OY3 MARAETOTARA - 29 May 1994

The third OY for 1994 was a landmark event for the club. It was our first club run on the new Maraetotara map and it appears to have been the biggest club event of all time. A total of 68 members and visitors turned out, plus the littlies on the taped course. We were very pleased to see several active members from earlier years and to also welcome a number of people who were trying orienteering for the first time. Nigel Brown set the first OY that I ran in on the Granules map in 1991 and he came back to have a look at the new Maraetotara version. Russell Mardon showed that he has lost little of his speed and orienteering skills during the three years he has spent in the air rather than on the ground and turned in a very fast time on the A course. A special welcome also to new members Ken and Kay Holst, for their first OY in Hawke's Bay. (It had been very windy overnight so I ran all of the controls on the high country on Sunday morning to check that they were still safe and sound. One would not want any "technical" problems on Ken's first OY. So what happened? The very first control on the A course, in the supposedly sheltered valley, blew flat on its face. Guess who was the first runner, destined to spend five minutes looking for it! Sorry, Ken).

It was very interesting to note that the times recorded on the new Maraetotara map were much faster than those achieved on the OYs held on Granules in 1991 and 1993. The new map is certainly more detailed and more accurate. There was at least as much climb on the 1994 course, yet Derek managed to run the seventeen controls at 8.5 minutes/km, well ahead of his 9.9 minutes/km in 1993 and Maurice's 8.8 minutes/km in 1991. The difference was even more pronounced on the 'B course which Eric took out in 10.6 minutes/km, far faster than had been achieved previously, while Catherine was also well ahead of previous times on the C course. The effect of the faster runability of the map was that both the A and B courses proved to be 7 - 8 minutes too short. Another thought though - perhaps we should give credit to Derek and Eric for just running faster and more accurately than the winners in previous years??

Thank you to everyone who contributed to what proved to be a very successful event, especially to Kath who set the D, E and F courses, to Wayne for checking the control sites and to David Fisher, Ross Berry, Brian Crawford, Tim Barnsley and Adrian Brown for collecting controls.

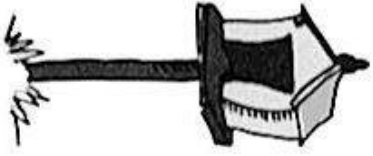
