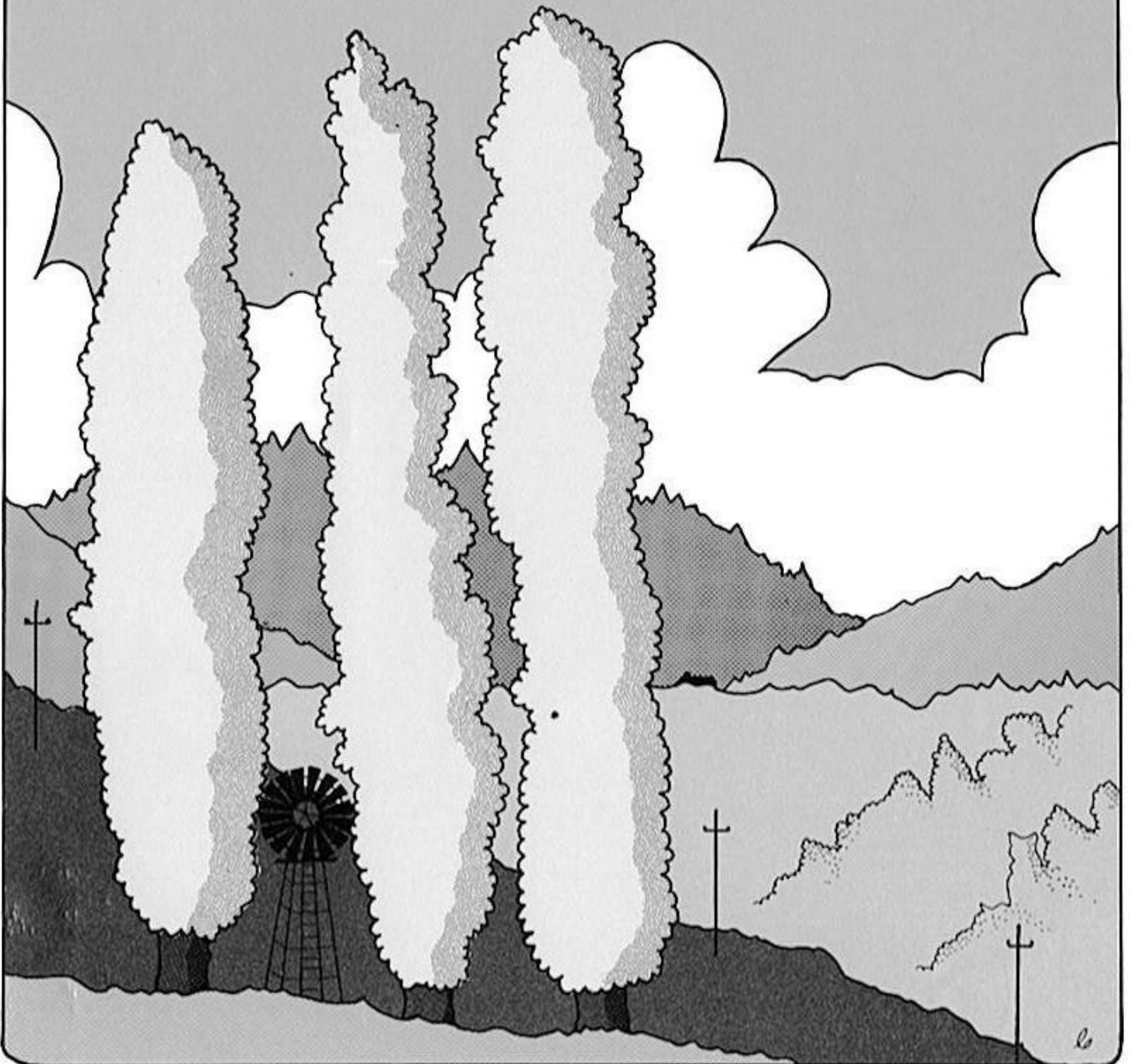

Malcolm Ingham, the current Wellington Orienteering Association WOA chairman is concerned that we are not legally part of WOA and has moved to exclude us. The other WOA clubs do not feel the same way so I feel it is unlikely to happen. I wonder if this would have happened if Derek hadn't been so competitive in their OY series?

Ross Morrison has done well in Australia with a 2nd in the M14 grade in the Australian Champs and 3rd in the Australian Secondary Schools Interstate Relay competition in the M15 grade. Derek was 7th in the M45 grade.

The business end of the orienteering year is starting with our club Short-O Champs today. Pamela and Geoff have done an excellent job organising the Blossom 3-day and I trust you will provide a helping hand at Labour Weekend.

The AGM is approaching on December 3rd and I intend to promote my idea of a streamlined committee comprising two executive members (Secretary and Treasurer) to handle the administration and two other members (President and one other committee member) to take care of promotion. JUNIOR SQUAD REPORT

What have the club juniors been up to? Out and about gaining valuable experience.

Six were at the Karapiti OY near Taupo, with the white course making a sight for sore eyes. 1st,2nd,3rd,4th - all HB! Emma, Helen, James, and Gemma, and with Lynley 2nd in the W14, and Brett 2nd in the M16, it was a successful raid.

Two weeks later we hit a club event at Taupo, held at Opepe West. 9 juniors made the trip (this was a coaching trip - all the coaches had good runs!!). Esther showed her potential when she beat home both

Caroline and Pamela on the Red long course. Once again, we did well on the white course, Emma was 2nd, and Sheree 3rd (in her first effort). Brett, Lynley, Jessica, Emma, James, and Gemma all performed, and a special mention for Sophie, who completed her first course on her own.

Coaching at Seafield Road was next where we had an excellent turnout. The first part of the session, we re enacted examples of good and bad orienteering. Amber played the part of the good orienteer to perfection while Ross had his imagination working overtime playing the bad guy.

We then went in groups of 3 or 4 and did 3 controls with a coach explaining the techniques necessary in finding the control.

It was then onto a fun team race, where each team of 4 started at 3 minute interval. On a course of between 4 and 6 controls (red, orange, yellow and white courses had been set). There were some excellent efforts, especially Ross, (warming up for Tasmania), Ben, Anthony, and Sophie. Esther, Rowan and Sheree enjoyed their 1st session, and it was good to have 'invited' club members along to train, too.



Fourteen juniors boarded the bus to Waiterere Beach to take part in the Frank Smith Trophy. What a great effort was put in, - even without Esther and Ross, our top female and male juniors. Without seeing the full results, some tremendous efforts were put in. Ben was 2nd in the orange long course, Rowan and Danny in the yellow, along with Lynley and Jessica, but once again those HB names at the head of the white course. Amber was 2nd girl (1st W12, beating the M12 National Champion!), and David Costigan, on his first run on a colour map, 2nd boy (1st in M12!). Emma, James and Brendon were all close behind.

Incredibly, 17 juniors, under the age of 18 have entered the Blossom 3 day at Labour Weekend, and we must have a great chance of picking up the trophy that has been made for the occasion. Remember a few vital things before you start; 1) **Concentrate** 2) **Don't go too fast early** 3) **Make sure you finish - (don't give up).**

Good luck to you all, I'm confident you will all do well.

Lastly, Ross did excellent things in Australia - 15th out of 42 in M16 individual at the Southern Cross Challenge. Involved in the relay team that came 3rd at the Aussie Secondary School Champs (don't know how Ross qualified for that!), and was second in the Australian Champs in M14!! Great effort.

Success for Morrisons

The Morrison orienteering family of Havelock North gained some success at the Australian championships in Tasmania on Saturday. Competing in the men's 14 years' age-group, Ross Morrison finished second in a time of 36 minutes and 58 seconds for the 4.1 kilometre course to be only 51 seconds behind title winner Miguel Clark of South Australia. Morrison's father Derek took out seventh place in the men's 45 years' age-group in a time of 1 hour and six minutes for the 6.5km course, over eight minutes behind winner Hugh Moore of ACT.

ORIENTEERING: The New Zealand junior squad collected several minor placings at the Australian secondary schools interstate competition in Tasmania this week.

In the 15 years and under age-group event, the boys' relay team — David Barr (Hamilton), Ross Morrison (Hawkes Bay) and Auckland's David Stewart — finished third.

The girls' relay team of Michelle Nash (Auckland), Fiona Moriks (Auckland) and Felicity Anderson (Masterton) finished fourth in the 15 years and under division while the boys' relay team also took fourth in the 16-19 years age-group.

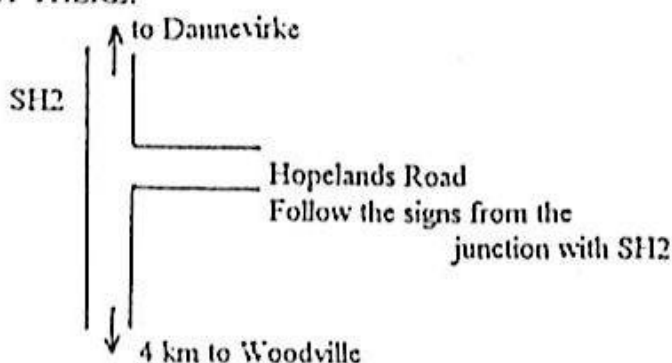

FRIMLEY PARK - 1 September 1996

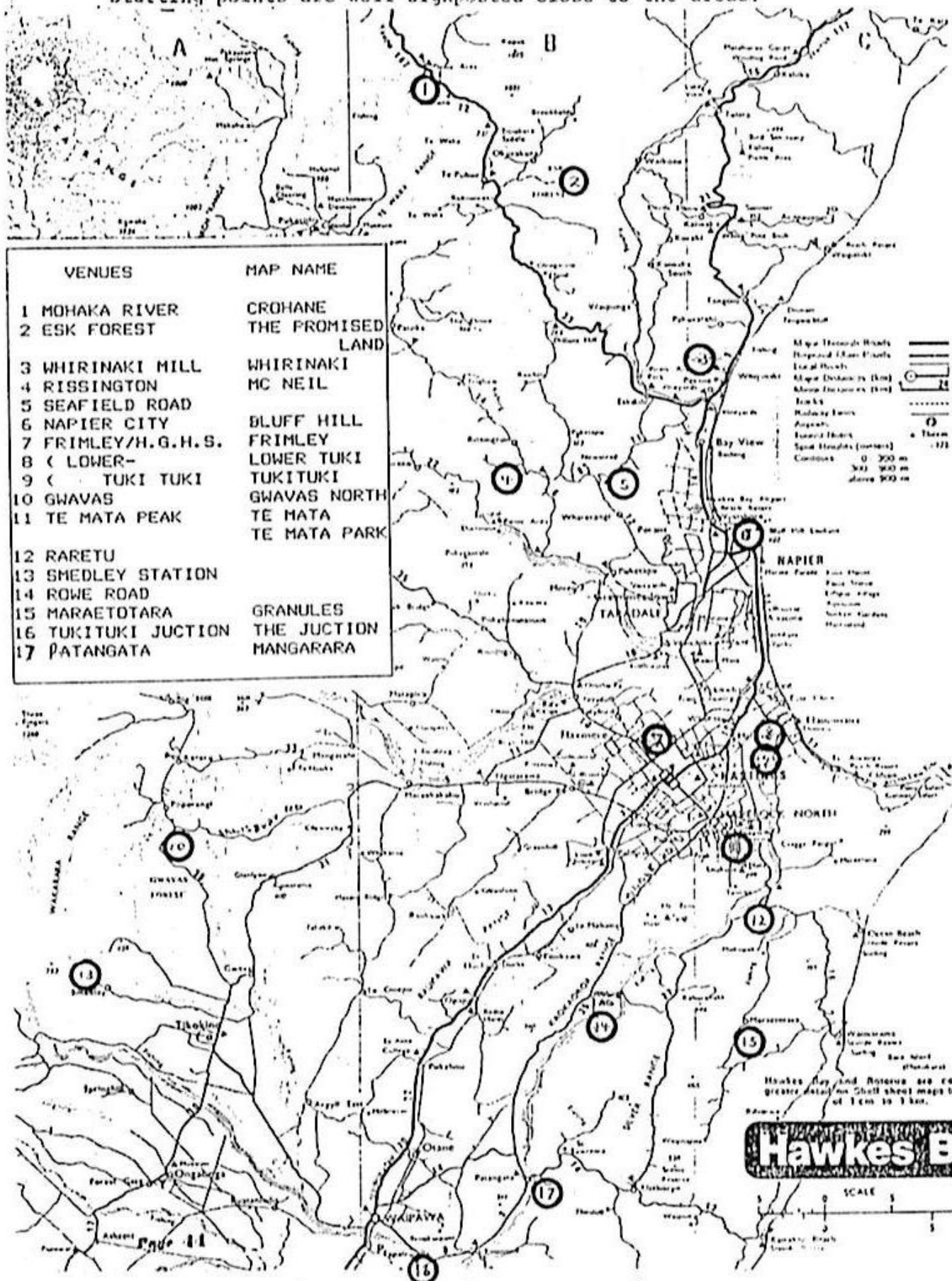


Areas used by the H.B. Orienteering Club. Permission is required for most areas and therefore they may only be entered during official Club Meetings.

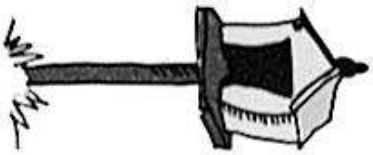
