What was that Derek?

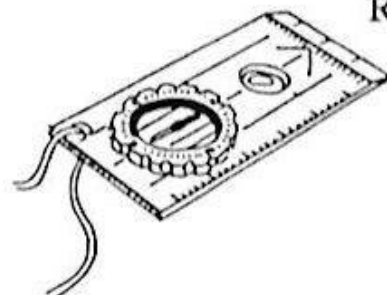
You want me to set the courses for Lower Tukituki.

ART DECO ORIENTEERING



Those of you who did not come to Bluff Hill on 27th July missed out on the most intriguing club event of the year. All but one of the controls on my course were points of historic interest, and with the exception of Hukarere School, none of them were well known. Nearly all of them were inconspicuous to the average passer-by but the excellent control described supplied enough information to arouse your interest and made the whole course very exciting.

To be correct, most of sites were much earlier than the Art Deco period as they were mostly on Napier Hill itself rather than the lower commercial area which was rebuilt after the earthquake. They varied from the first Napier hospital in Sealy Road, to a window in the Cathedral made up of stained glass fragments salvaged from the earthquake.

One site was a genuine orienteering control being the boulder that Bishop Selwyn preached from in 1842. It most probably would have been omitted from a proper orienteering map because it was not quite a metre high but Bishop Selwyn has made it famous in its own right.

Norris must have done a lot of research and fully deserves our thanks for making the Bluff Hill event such a rewarding exercise. Make a note to come next year and maybe we will find out where Ormond Chapel was built in 1863 before it was transferred to Napier Terrace.

In the meantime I will retain the map and control descriptions so we can take our visitors on a fascinating trip around Napier - by car of course.

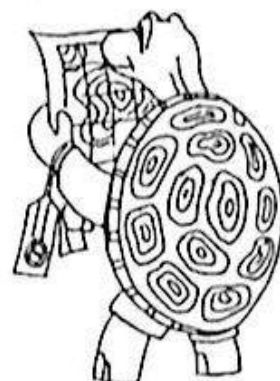

Days 2 & 3 Kawhia Forest

Other Activities (based at the Marae)

Saturday night – Short coaching discussion evening taken by WACO members and including how to handle the different terrain at Kawhia. Also stories, maps etc from the recent World Champs.

Sunday night – NZ Indoor Control Clipping Championships, Spotprize and prizes evening. Prizes will be awarded for the most outrageous orienteering stories and then the rest of the evening will be free to swap lies about route choice and the control that got away. Early in the evening a hangi meal will be available. More details will be in the programme.

Event Centre

The event centre will be the famous Maketu Marae, on the edge of the water at the picturesque fishing village of Kawhia, with a charge of only \$6 a head per day for accommodation in the sleeping halls. Camping will also be available at the same cost. All facilities for cooking, washing, socialising etc are available.

Within 10mins is the main beach and hot sand pools, the golf course with \$5 green fees, the free museum, tramping tracks and scenic reserves and of course the excellent fishing.

Ask anyone that has stayed there before...it's a fantastic atmosphere!

Facilities are two sleeping buildings with mattresses and pillows (you need sleeping bags) and the main building with a well equipped kitchen (knives, forks, plates, pots etc provided) and a large eating and socialising area. All you need to bring is food! Hot showers are available. Camping is also available adjacent to the Marae. Cost per person per day is \$6, whether staying in the Marae or camping alongside.

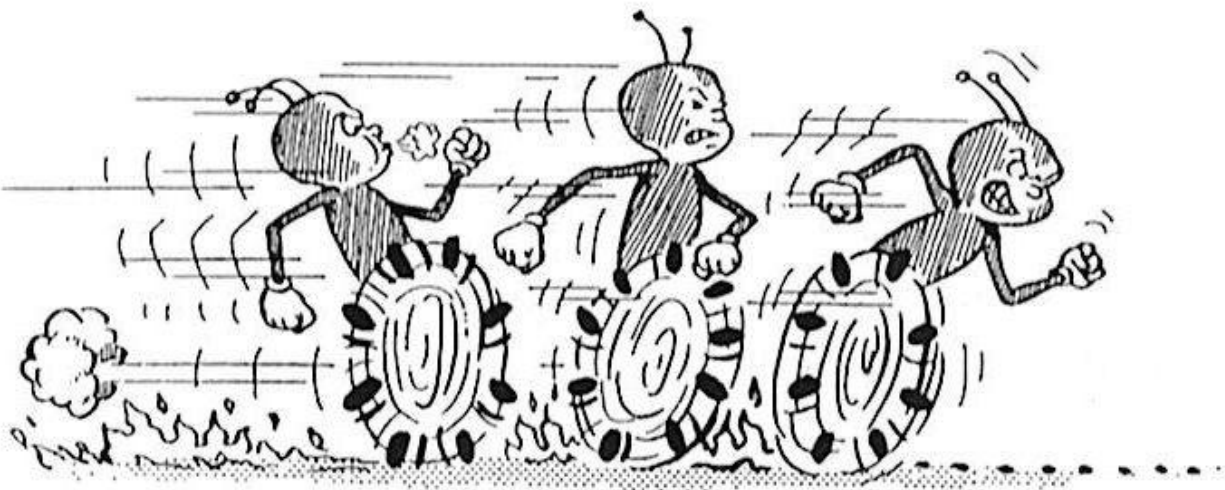
Junior Squad

A coaching session was held at Pukeora Hill, 2 weeks prior to the NZSS Champs. Derek, Bruce, and Geoff acted as coaches for the day. Everyone split into groups, with route choice and attack points being the themes. Each group worked around a course of 6 controls, discussing techniques, speed, etc. To finish the session, everyone had a chance to test their skills on a short course on their own.

12 of the squad turned out in the NZSS Champs in a variety of grades. Though inexperienced, their performances auger well for the future, with some real talented prospects amongst them. Naomi Schumacher's 2nd in the Senior Girls Std, in effectively her first orienteering race was an outstanding achievement. The Pukeora coaching session was obviously a success for her. Other bold showings were in the Intermediate Boys Std, where Rowan Maloney came 4th and Clinton Smith 6th. Jessica Fargher, 7th and the improving Jenny Russell, 10th, did excellently in the large Junior Girls Championship. Two top ten finishes in this grade was a great effort. We also had two top 10 finishers in the Senior Girls Std, with Naomi's 2nd, and Tanya Dillon's 9th, though Tanya was disappointed with her result, hoping to finish closer. Paul Emmerson's 11th in the Junior Boys Championship, and Brett Taylor's 19th in the Intermediate Boys Championship were both creditable performances, as they were in large fields. Robert Hunt, Mikaela Harker, and Max Depinoy, were all disappointed with their showing, but lack of experience lead to their downfall. Robert and Mikaela have very exciting potential, and hopefully they'll bounce back, because they have the ability to go to the top.

We now have a squad of 33, and there is plenty more orienteering coming up to improve your skills. The Frank Smith Trophy on October 12th, where we travel as a club [on the bus], and take on the other 5 WOA clubs. A good turnout in this is essential. Remember, the Juniors nearly won it for us last year. As well as that, there is the CD, and Wellington Champs, [both pre-entry], our own HB Champs, Labour weekend 3-day [pre-entry], WOA relays, night champs, Rogaine, etc,etc...

Our next coaching session is on September 28th.



1997 NZOF COURSE SETTING COMPETITION

Again, this year the Editor of *NZ Orienteering* has decided to organise another Course Setting Competition. As was done in the 1996 competition organised by Bruce Collins, this years competition will be run along the same lines. Therefore, this years competition offers:

1. Three categories to choose from
2. Prize-money up for grabs
3. Trophies available
4. Profits after prize-money and expenses (postage, etc) will go to the "One New Zealand Fund" which aids the travel expenses of South Island juniors to enable them to go to training camps etc in the North Island.

Category 1 Senior - The SILVA Trophy and \$50 prize.

Two courses must be planned, one for M/W14A (Yellow) and one for the M40AS/W45A (Red).

Category 2 Junior (under 19yrs) - The Currie Trophy and \$40 prize.

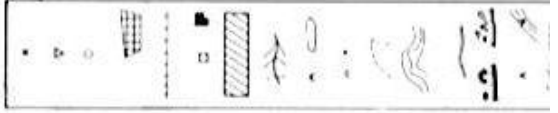

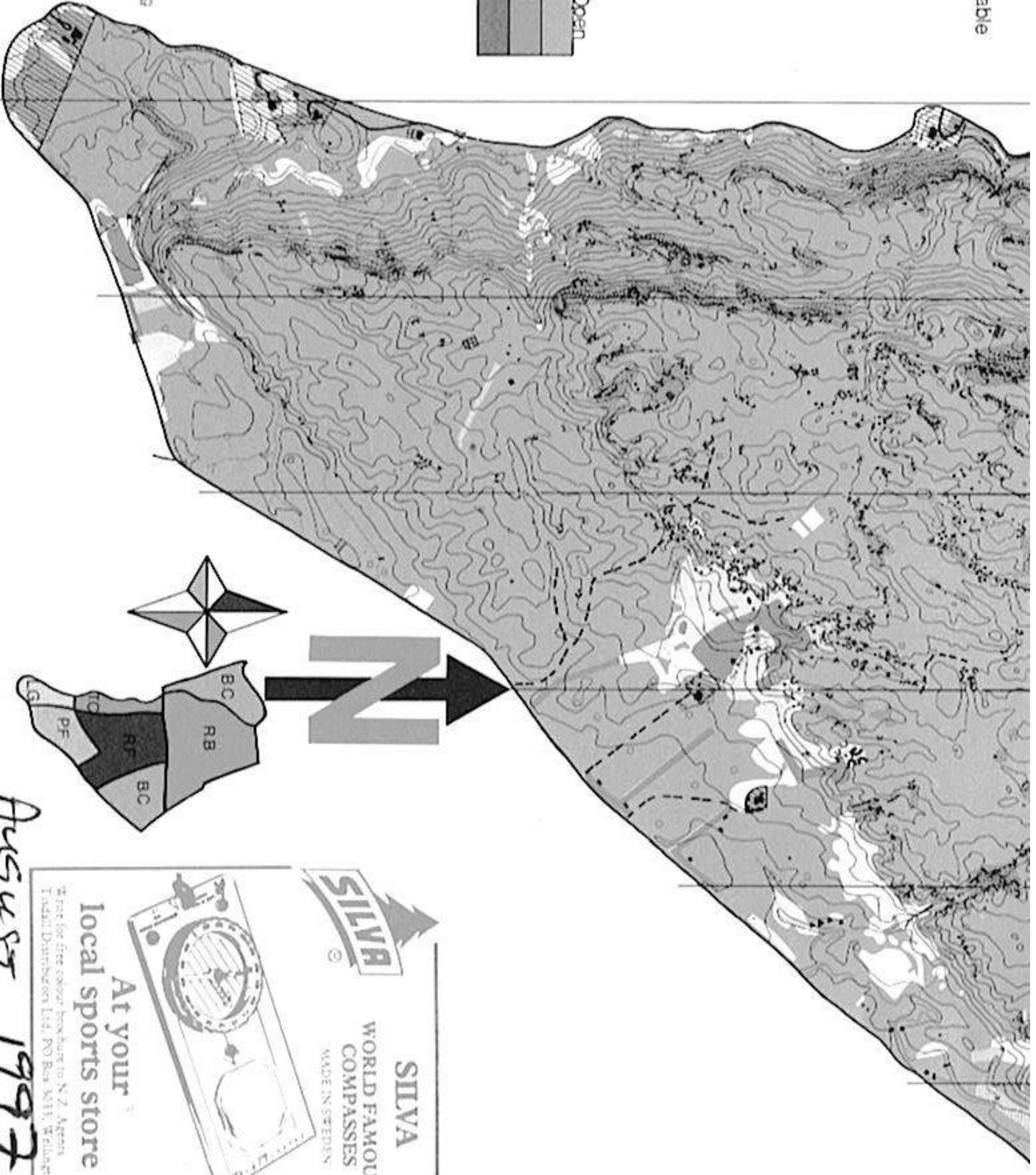
