Onlookers catch attacker

Dannevirke police were today praising quick action by onlookers who chased and caught a man after an attack on two people in Dannevirke's main street yesterday morning.

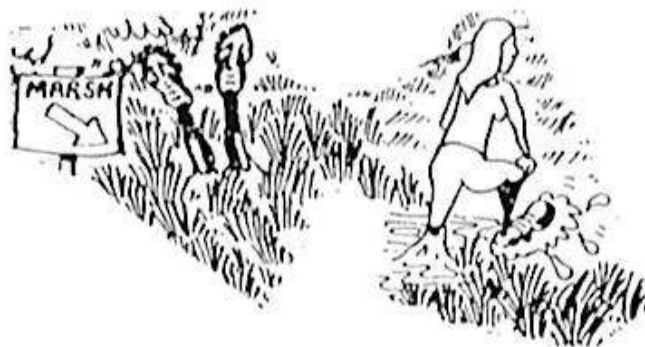
I was impressed by Amber Morrison's performance at the CD Champs in W16 when she won on very technical maps, with high quality orange courses set, especially the first day.

The performances auger well for the 37-strong team heading for the national championships in Auckland next weekend.



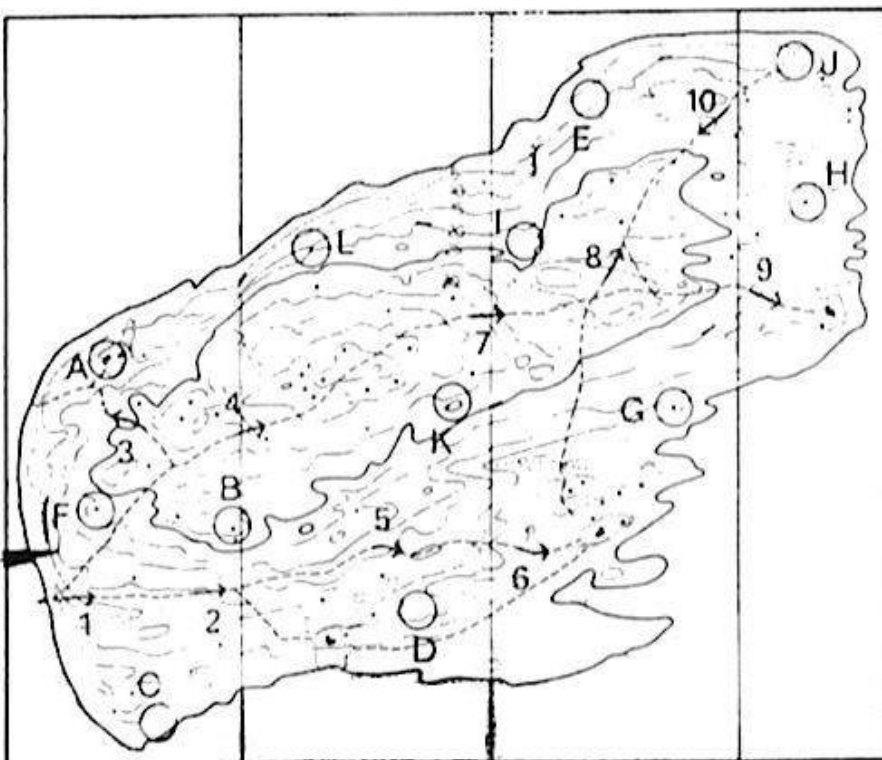
Contour lines

A Now it's time to learn about contour lines. They may be difficult to understand, but as a beginner you won't need to know too much.

This is a map of an island. On the map you see contour lines. We can imagine that the water rises several times, 5 meters each time. Every time the water rises 5 meters, we get a new coastline. These imaginary coastlines can be drawn as contour lines. On the northern side of the island, a number is indicated on each contour line. These numbers give the elevation above the water that each contour line represents.

Look at the contour line indicated by the arrow (15 m above the water). Now follow this contour line around the island. Where do you end up?

Hawke's Bay Orienteering Club members won 12 individual titles plus the interclub relay event for the club's best-ever national championship campaign over the Labour day weekend.

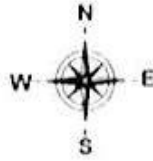
In long-distance classic races on Saturday, the club produced four A grade champions and three B grade winners. Peter Watson retained his M40 title with Ross Morrison (M18), Amber Morrison (W14) and Emma Watson (W12) dominating junior grades. B grade winners were Erica Hobbs (W21B), Brendan Lloyd (M14B) and Debbie Rose (W21C).

Another five titles came in the short-course event on Sunday — Ross Morrison, Emma Watson and Erica Hobbs, all completing the double, and brothers Geoff (M40) and Derek Morrison (M45) also winning.

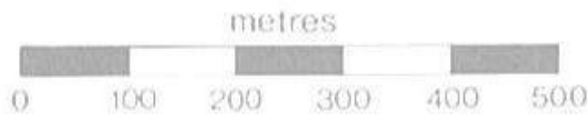

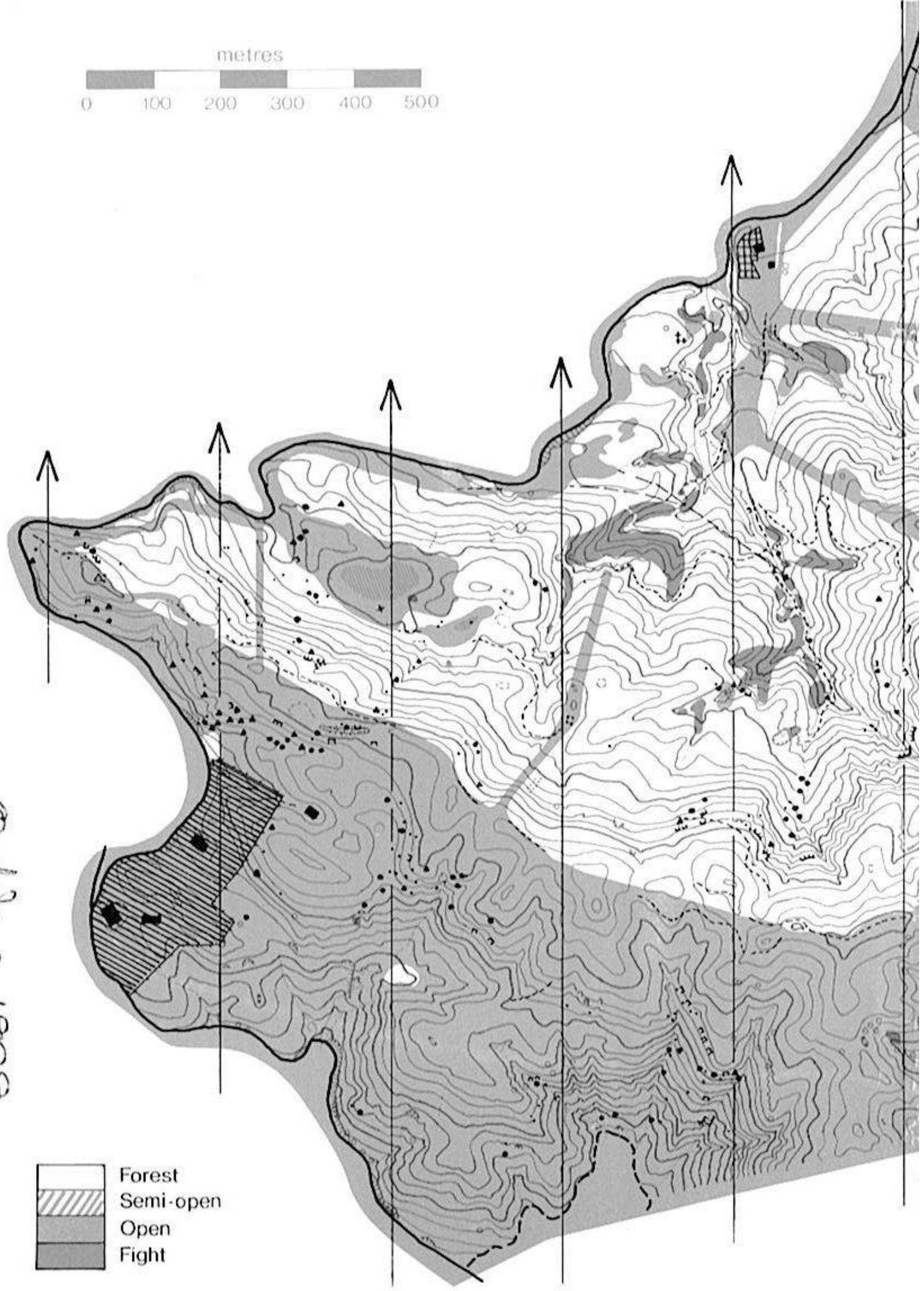
