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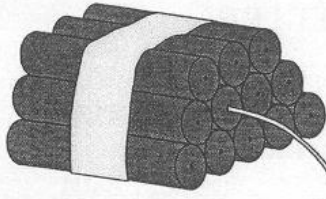

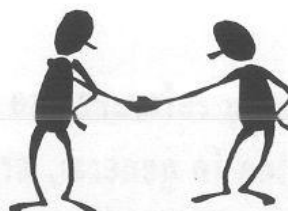

## Important Note: GATES

Land is a key orienteering resource... we all enjoy a bit of Park-O and Street-O now and again, but imagine if it were all we ever did! Without the farm and forest maps, orienteering would be a pretty dull sport (there has to be **some** reason why we're not all at harriers!)

So let's not put this precious commodity in jeopardy by carelessness. Wellington orienteers lost the use of an excellent orienteering map because of a simple mistake – a **gate left open**.

We all know to leave gates in the state (open/closed) that we find them, and Michael Wood (WOA) believes their problem was most likely caused by convoys. Often a whole series of orienteers' cars will go through a farm gate and leave it open for someone immediately behind to shut. Unfortunately, this can end up being a kind of 'Chinese Whispers' – somewhere amongst this chain of vehicles, the fact that the gate was ever shut gets lost from memory.

The solution to this is simple – **the person who opens the gate must close it**, no ifs, no buts.

## KATH BERRY

*On Thursday, May 2, Kath passed away peacefully after a year long battle with cancer. We will all miss someone who was a dedicated worker behind the scenes and up until just over a year ago, a regular participant at club events.*

*Kath & Alan joined the club in December 1990 and by the time we became involved in May 1991, they were already listed in the event report in the "thanks" section for helping with results processing and collecting controls. Whether it was a club event or a major event, Kath would always be one of the first to volunteer to help out – in the caravan, checking clipcards (I'd hate to say how many clipcards she has checked at major events!), bagging maps, stuffing envelopes and all those little jobs that happen behind the scenes. She also assisted Alan with course-setting for club events a number of times, often taking charge of the yellow and white courses and I'm sure being the springboard for ideas for the other courses.*

*The Kaweka Challenge is another event in which Kath's contribution on the committee and at the Kuripapango base during the event for a number of years cannot be overlooked. She was certainly an integral member of the "Berry" team which has been part of the driving force behind this event.*

*Although Kath struggled with the HB heat at times and felt the effects of aging hips and knees, she was up until a few years ago a regular competitor at major events around the country. She continued to participate at local club events, up until OY1 at Seafield Road on March 25, 2001, where she, like a number of us, succumbed to the heat and the hills. In the weeks prior to that, she had been a regular participant in the summer series where she had always finished in the top half of the field on the short course. Kath was typically modest of her orienteering performances, but her drawn routes on her map afterwards always seemed to lack the detours that many of us undertake in an effort to locate those elusive controls. I'm sure, as well, there was some pretty serious competition at times on the Red Short course.*

*Some in the club, particularly the single males, were especially fortunate to discover that Kath was a very good cook. After a day at work, there was often a good meal available before a committee meeting or during a major event, when nothing at home gets done, it was nice to be invited for a meal at the Berry's.*

*We will all miss Kath. Our sympathy and condolences go out to Alan, Ross, Jan and their families.*

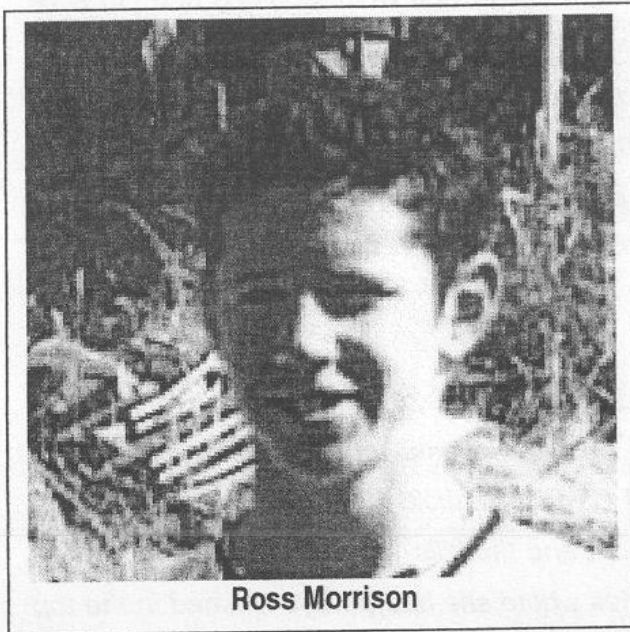
## TODD OATES AND ROSS MORRISON – JWOC REPRESENTATIVES

Todd Oates and Ross Morrison have recently become the first club members to represent New Zealand at a Junior World Championships. They are part of a 6-man men's team that also includes an ancillary member of the club, Bryn Davies, and they will be heading to Spain in July. Want to know more about these fine young men? Then read on...

### *How did you get into orienteering?*

**Ross:** I went along to the Hawke's Bay Orienteering Club with my parents when I was 6 years old.

**Todd:** A teacher at my school in England took the boys from my school orienteering some weekends in the school mini-bus. A friend suggested I went – I did, and I've got gradually more serious since. I was 13 when I began at my first club, Airienteers (Airedale and Wharfedale in Yorkshire England).



### *What are your other sports/hobbies?*

### *How are you preparing for JWOC?*

### *What orienteering achievement are you proudest of to date (other than getting to JWOC)?*

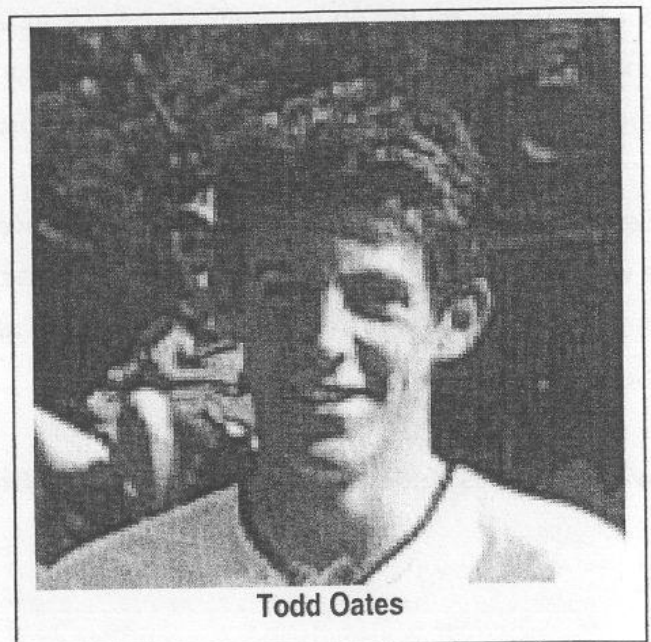
**Ross:** Winning all my events at the ANZ challenge.

### NEW ZEALAND TO COMPETE IN AUSTRALIA'S NATIONAL LEAGUE

Orienteering Australia has agreed to accept a New Zealand team as part of their annual National Orienteering League. While New Zealand will not compete in all of the league events, it is planned to compete in several events, later in the year.

### ELIGIBILITY FOR A-LEVEL EVENTS & INSTITUTIONAL MEMBERSHIPS

Now that all club members are affiliated to the NZOF via their club's affiliation they are eligible to compete in NZOF A-level events. However, this eligibility does not extend to those individuals who are club members via an institutional membership (high school, polytechnic, etc). To enter A-level events, such members must either take out an individual club membership or pay a one-event registration of \$9 per race (senior) or \$5.50 per race (junior). Non-members of clubs are also required to pay a one-event registration to enter A-level events. (The category of wayfarer is not recognised for such events.) For all other events, participation is a club management issue.

### GRANTS FOR EVENTS WITH PRIZES

The NZOF Council has determined that if an event carries unsponsored prizes then it is deemed to be sufficiently profitable that NZOF will not consider any development grant or other form of subsidy.

### COMMUNITY PURPOSES LEVY

George Hawkins, Minister of Internal Affairs, has advised that after consideration it was decided that the profits from non-casino gaming machines "should continue to be distributed locally in support of sports clubs, arts and cultural groups and community organisations. That means there will be no community purposes levy".

### REGIONAL ASSOCIATIONS

Recently Peninsula and Plains requested a letter from the NZOF setting out that they were recognised as the regional organisation for Canterbury. This enabled the club to use Christchurch City Council parks free of charge. Other clubs can also request similar recognition, especially where they are not already part of an established Area Association. Such clubs could include Whangarei, Egmont, Hawkes Bay and others in the South Island besides PAPO. Contact the General Manager for more details.

If you haven't subscribed this year, you won't have seen the new format of our national magazine. Forty pages of news, views, major event results, coaching tips, secondary school orienteering, Australian Diary, course setting competition results and more. The subscription for four issues is \$12, plus an extra \$1.20 per issue to have it mailed direct to your letterbox. An all-up annual subscription fee of \$16.80.

## COURSE SETTER'S CHECKLIST

<input type="checkbox"/> VETTER	- liaise with your vetter – this is usually an experienced orienteer who can answer any questions you have.
<input type="checkbox"/> MAPS	- what sort of map are you using? Make sure you have both fenced and unfenced versions and also any existing enlargements (for white & yellow courses).
	- old offset printed maps are stored in the shed (along with a lot of other club equipment) at Mardon's (876 8558) with extra supplies at G & P Morrison's (8774 870).
	- printed supplies of OCAD maps and OCAD files are held by David Fisher (844 8282). You will need to determine whether there are existing prints that you can use, or organise for the map to be printed for your event.
	- any enlargements can be done at Lola Copy (cheapest – Havelock North), Rush Print (Hastings) or Copy World (Napier). The club has an account with all these businesses.
<input type="checkbox"/> COURSES	- the club has a 'Course planning Guide' available (ask the fixtures officer for a copy) and also some library books on the subject (in a suitcase in the caravan). Read these for some background information and liaise with your vetter regarding your proposed start area, parking and general course layout – once these problems are solved you can then start your serious course planning.
<input type="checkbox"/> CONTROL DESCRIPTIONS	- the club owns software (CONDES) for preparing control descriptions. If you don't have a computer ask someone who has to assist – it will make your job much easier. - if you would like a copy of CONDES, download it from <a href="http://www.finn.arildsen.com">www.finn.arildsen.com</a> , otherwise contact David Fisher (844 8282) for a copy and the club registration number.
<input type="checkbox"/> LANDOWNERS	- you should have received a letter from the landowner liaison officer advising you of the property landowners. You will need to communicate with these people before you go onto their properties and keep them informed regarding your event. - determine whether there are any hazards to be notified to competitors. There is a special board in the caravan for this purpose.
<input type="checkbox"/> PUBLICITY	- a week before the event, advise the publicity officer – Hamish Goodwin (874 9383) of your proposed start place.
<input type="checkbox"/> CARAVAN	- this is stored at the Mardon's (844 8282). Phone before visiting to arrange collection of the key. - check supplies to ensure important items are available – clipcards, plastic bags, toilet paper, paper cups, start & registration schedules. If supplies are short or something needs repairing contact the equipment officer – Richard Lynn (843 7511).

<input type="checkbox"/> CONTROLS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- these are in the caravan (nos. 201 – 255). Contact David Fisher (844 8282) if you need any extras.</li> <li>- these will need to be put out the day before the event.</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> MASTER MAPS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- two master maps are required for each course.</li> <li>- these must be prepared using red pen. Control circles (5 - 6mm diameter), start triangle (7mm equilateral), finish circles (5 &amp; 7mm diameters).</li> <li>- photocopy (black &amp; white) "all controls master" for control collection (approx. 6 copies).</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> WATER	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- generally we do not provide water on courses, however water &amp; cups should be available at the finish. Remember to fill the water container .</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> HELPER	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- a club member has been allocated the job of "event assistant" for the morning Contact this person, to determine whether they are available and what time they are needed.</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> ON THE DAY- before	<p>Setter, vetter and event assistant:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- start as early as possible, as you need to be fully prepared by 10.15am.</li> <li>- put signposts out. Don't take it for granted that everyone knows where the event or map is. Use the big '400m' warning sign on the busiest road before the event, where people will be slowing down to turn into a minor road or gateway.</li> <li>- synchronise clocks at the event, particularly the one at the start and the one at the finish.</li> <li>- set up a toilet.. Dig a deep hole a spade-width wide, place toilet over hole, erect tent around toilet (with as much space at front as possible), peg toilet into place, insert rubbish bag liner (with bottom cut off) into toilet and tape into place, get toilet paper &amp; hand-washing gel from caravan.</li> <li>- tape master maps onto tables and place in position. Check that sufficient red or violet pens are available and that these are in working order - attach to strings.</li> <li>- put out the start triangle.</li> <li>- set up a string course, starting from the finish desk for ease of time-keeping. Try to make this as interesting as possible.</li> <li>- complete course information blackboard – courses available, length, climb and any other special information.</li> <li>- set up other equipment around caravan – tables, start time sheets, control descriptions/clipcards, hazards board, notice board.</li> <li>- set up finish area – 'finish' banner (in caravan), table, seat, printer clock, pen &amp; paper.</li> <li>- if weather is doubtful, it will be necessary to erect the tunnel tent for the map tables and the caravan awning for tables around caravan. Both tents are in the caravan. The club also owns a larger tent, contact the equipment officer early, if you think this may be necessary.</li> <li>- allocate jobs – someone in the caravan dealing with registrations, someone at the finish and someone answering queries, helping newcomers, etc. Don't be afraid to ask other club members for assistance. Remember the event assistant must be relieved so that they can have a run.</li> </ul>

<input type="checkbox"/> ON THE DAY - after	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- organise people for control collection (before they go home).</li> <li>- take any offer of help to dismantle the toilet.</li> <li>- once collected, place controls in order, to ensure they have all been collected.</li> <li>- place all equipment, neatly, into caravan and fasten with bungies.</li> <li>- pick up signposts.</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> CANCELLATIONS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- co-ordinate with your vetter and the Fixtures Officer - Terry Russell (873 4138) when determining whether an event should be cancelled or postponed.</li> <li>- the cancellation should be phoned to the radio stations (phone 833 8400 (office) or 0800 22 25 27 (studio)) as early as possible.</li> <li>- the Fixtures Officer should co-ordinate a "committee phone around" to members.</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> REPORT	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- as setter for the day you are required to write an event report for "Compass Points". Send to the newsletter editor – Linda Patterson (<a href="mailto:loopy@clear.net.nz">loopy@clear.net.nz</a>) ASAP after the event.</li> </ul>
<input type="checkbox"/> THANKS	<p>Thanks for a job well done – you have made your contribution to the club for another year.</p>

**P.S. Please remember to always and at all times communicate with the Landowner(s) when you will be visiting their properties. It is also a good idea to give them a description of your vehicle, even your registration number so that if someone reports a strange vehicle on their property they will be aware of who it is. Remember our sport is dependent on the co-operation of the Landowners.**

**We have had a couple of instances of people going on to maps without first informing the landowner, who has subsequently and justifiably been upset. We do not want to lose the privilege of being able to use any of our maps due to an avoidable situation so remember communication is the key!**

At last we got to run on the already legendary Over The Hill map!

Reminiscent of the debacle last year over the Schools Champs (twice changed), the portents of a repeat were omnipresent as the setter negotiated vast numbers of cattle in the preceding week.

In true "just in time" fashion the stock passed MAF inspection and boarded the trucks to join their Cruise Boat on the eve of the event. Unfortunately, the promised haymaking failed to materialise and the large paddock of clover remained uncut – but the farmer was relaxed about anyone choosing to wade through.

The drama did not stop there. Presumably due to maladjustment from daylight saving hours, two carloads of Central HB orienteers, well known in club circles, appeared fully an hour before the first start time. They were duly put to work digging dunnies etc.

People continued to stream in all day, even after the usual closing time (by prior arrangement), though I'm sure many were there for the hang-gliding and just happened to get carried away by the orienteering instead. So much so, that we set new records for attendance at a HB club event.

Then came the depressing news from Bruce Perry that our first control on the Red Short Course was wrongly described on the Control Descriptions (less than 50 metres away, but the wrong number and description). Some clipped the control on the rock and others did a grid search, naturally losing varying amounts of time. Fortunately the number of competitors on Red Short was the smallest of all, and no-one chose to register a protest – great sportsmanship folks, let's hope the OY Series isn't decided on this glitch.

(As an aside, the only other similar setting error made by YT affected the first OY in 1994 and who should have discovered it – yes, Bruce Perry!)

Contrary to sundry mutterings from other competitors, no other controls were misplaced, and on checking the map of one of these mutterers I noticed that the control circle had been drawn over the wrong feature altogether. An extra minute at the map table is an investment worth making.



In the midst of all this mayhem, one of our early competitors discovered a cattle beast in a distressed state, fast weakening, hidden from view and stuck in a deep hole. So deep that the farmer had to hire a commercial digger to excavate the poor animal. It came out alive. We could have charged the kids double for the day's entertainment.

In addition to the sideshow, there was keen competition in most grades chasing the first OY points for the year, auguring well for an exciting season.

Despite first impressions, the steepness of the map was not a major factor, as competitors were given a variety of route choice legs and climb was well within acceptable limits. Surprisingly no-one used the road on Course 1 (the setter's choice) and racing was close, with just 18 minutes separating first from last. Some new names are showing high on the leaderboard, as Hamish Goodwin and Chris Howell put pressure on the "old guard". Geoff Morrison fought off a case of brain fade in the middle of the course to win by 3 minutes from Hamish with Ross Morrison in third.

Red Medium saw a victory for a newer member, Wayne Hosking, while Amber Morrison surprised in the Women's Grade, followed home by Erica Hobbs (first time at this level) taking advantage of Pam Morrison's uncharacteristic "off" on Control 8.

Red Short was affected by Control 1, but Bruce Perry was always likely to win this course, regardless of rustiness. The Women's side was more seriously influenced by the problem – sorry Caroline – and Catherine Lee sneaked a win, showing what a hot prospect she is this year!

Middle aged cunning eclipsed youthful exuberance on the Orange course for men. Bob Pocknall carried on last year's form with a 2 minute buffer over the ever improving multi-sporter, David Tait, with Jack Vincent just another minute back showing the skills he learnt at the junior camp in January. Helen Watson pipped Cara McDonald in the Women's Orange by a mere 24 seconds as the Junior girls dominated the grade, with Erica Boland-Bristow a close third.

Aari Barrett displayed his talent with a 7 minute victory on Yellow over Duncan Morrison, with Sam Eames another 7 minutes back in third. Jacqui Campbell was also convincing with a 5 minute gap to Kate Morrison and Lizzy McNutt close behind.

Chris McDonald easily won White showing the benefit of experience. He was followed by a number of High School boys gearing up for the North Island Secondary Schools Champs. Stephen Dodd of NBHS showed promise in second with Bevan Waayer in third.

Jaime Goodwin took maximum points in the Girls with Lorraine MacKenzie (Caitlyn's Mum) heading off Rachael Ferguson for second.

My thanks go to all of those people who pitched in and helped by manning the caravan, the finish, doing the toilets, clipcard checking, cleaning up and control collection. I can recall Amber, Richard, Brian, Val, Geoff, Peter, Bruce, Faye, Alan, and Ken.

Remember that no matter what grade you enter, there is always a task you can assist the organisers with, even if it is for twenty minutes or so. Control Collection is a good way to learn more about locating those elusive controls without the pressure of race time ticking away.

Special thanks to Rob McDonald who volunteered at short notice to check all controls for me and help put them out on the Saturday. Rob came back at 10pm to check all of the numbers, courses, master maps and control descriptions.

YET, between us, we still got one wrong.

I DEMAND THAT YOU CHANGE YOUR COURSE 15 DEGREES NORTH, I SAY AGAIN, THAT'S ONE FIVE DEGREES NORTH, OR COUNTER-MEASURES WILL BE UNDERTAKEN TO ENSURE THE SAFETY OF THIS SHIP.

**Canadians:** This is a lighthouse. Your call!

## CONTROL COLLECTION

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I put a suggestion to our committee at their last meeting that I thought it would be a good idea to have an organised voluntary system of collecting controls at each event. Try it for one year to see how it goes. I also offered to organise it!!

They discussed it, and decided I could give it a go. The subject had been discussed two years ago, but no action was taken.

Control collection at club events has always been a "Who wants to collect controls?" cry at 3pm. Almost always there are people waiting and offering to do the job. This is good, because the very last thing a setter and vetter want to do is to have to collect the whole lot themselves. Been there and done that.

What is not good, is that the volunteers are nearly always the same people. From my observations you wouldn't get past two hands if you were to count them! Over a period of time I think this would prove to be divisive, and with a club our size quite unnecessary.

Orienteers do not realise what is involved in setting an event until they do it themselves. Their first time is a big shock to the system. After that experience some folk volunteer to help at events on all sorts of jobs.. In the "olden days" when we had perhaps thirty or forty competitors, the setter and vetter could handle the demands of the day, but would always appreciate help at control collection time. Consider the effort **currently** required through the day, with possibly over one hundred people taking part.

I think four collectors at each event [could be a family], would mean about two or three events per year per person should cover it.

Collecting controls is a way to improve your orienteering skills. Walking is good, there is no pressure, and you really get to read that map. I reckon most people would be keen. They might even be just waiting for this to happen!! Once you know which event you are helping at you would adjust your day accordingly. If something important cropped up, swap your day with someone else. What do you say ?

As Alan once said: "We know how to run a small club, and a medium size club. How do you run a big club?"

So where to from here?

I'll wait one week for you to read this and phone or email me to volunteer. After that I'll start phoning. Beginning with the regulars.

Now let's see, which is the next event? Not Hamish and Stewart surely?

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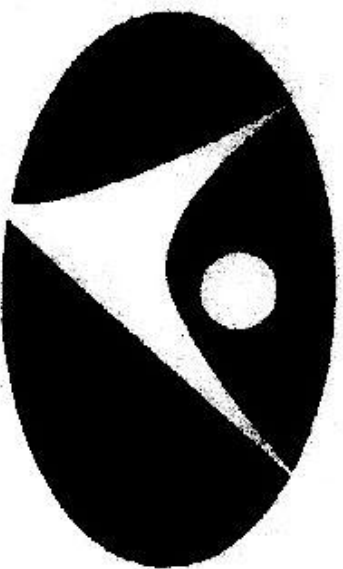
