#### **AMENDMENTS TO INCORPORATED SOCIETIES ACT**

Recent changes to the Incorporated Societies Act, although relatively minor, make filing requirements easier for people involved with incorporated societies. The amendments can be found on the Ministry of Economic Development's website, [ww.biz.org.nz](http://www.biz.org.nz), or alternatively are available from the NZOF General Manager. A majority of clubs affiliated with the NZOF are incorporated but a few remain unincorporated. Recent disadvantages for clubs of not being incorporated include not being able to apply for gaming trust funding for those selected for NZ teams and not being able to take out land access permits with the Crown. The NZOF continues to urge all clubs to become incorporated.

# NZOF 2007 Fixtures: draft outline

A National Fixtures Meeting was held on 15 April 2006 at Richmond Nelson. Thirteen of 18 clubs were represented, the absences being North West, Pinelands, Taranaki, Wairarapa and Marlborough. The aim of the meeting was to set in place as much of the 2007 major events calendar as possible.

The draft programme that follows is the outcome of the meeting and is, at present, a discussion document, not a definitive programme. Comment and further offers to host major events are invited before the programme is finalised and clubs are asked to submit pro forma event applications. It is hoped that the final draft programme will be published before 30 June.

Suggestions raised at the meeting.

1. Nationals could be built around Anzac Day (25 April) to avoid the disadvantages of Easter being a moving festival. Currently Anzac Day falls in school holidays and when on a weekday can be linked with nearest weekend for three or four-day carnival. However, in some years Anzac Day will be on a weekend.
2. Nationals could be held at Queens Birthday without the relays; these would be held at an Easter event as a family fun event.
3. Schools championships should (could) be backed with public races to increase spectator audience for schools competitions and to increase appeal for adults volunteering.
4. Schools rogaining is a possible area of opportunity.

IF HCS remit was in force with Nationals 2007 at Easter, as per above, then:

1. Zone 1 championship date would be 31 March-1 April
2. Zone 2 championship date would most likely be after Easter (6-9 April).
3. Zone 3 championship date would be between Easter (6-9 April) and QB (2-4 June)
4. Number of weekends between Easter and QB in 2007 are seven with two of these (in the draft programme above) already being used for a major event, viz. NI & SI Secondary School Championships, 20-22 April and 19-20 May respectively.

# The 2005 Telecom GEN-I Hawkes Bay Sports Awards

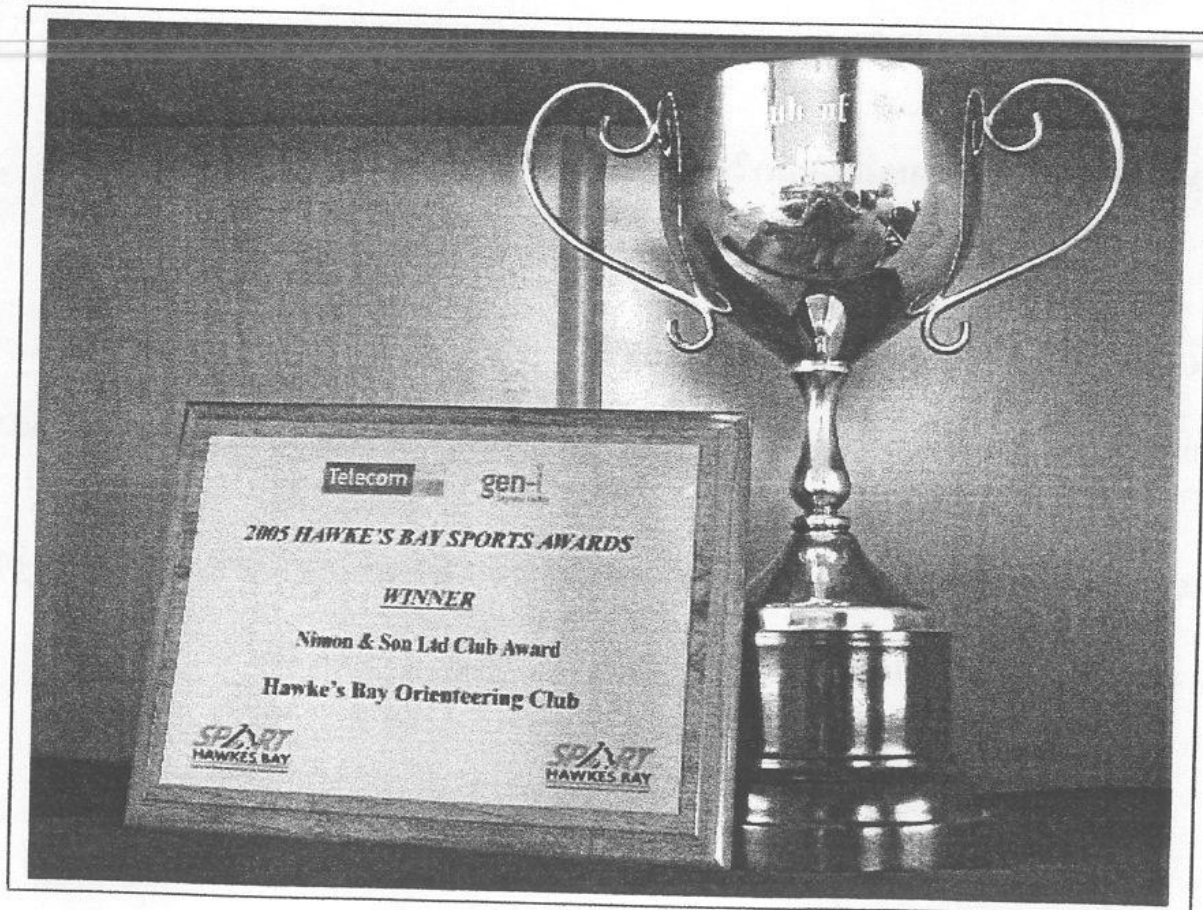

# Coaching Corner

## Clothing and Equipment

### Footwear

Footwear is a very important part of any sport and orienteering is no different. Comfortable running shoes are suitable for starters, but in hillier or wet areas, footwear with a good grip is desirable. Wet and muddy ground is all part of orienteering.

Specialist orienteering shoes with studded soles are normally worn by regular orienteers. These are lightweight, made out of strong plastic material which will not absorb water.

But if you want something a lot cheaper which will do the same job, touch shoes are an ideal replacement. I've seen it all, from hiking boots to bare feet.

Shoelaces coming undone when shoes get wet are often a problem, so if you want to be certain that you will do a course without having to re-tie your laces you can do one of two things (or both). Double or triple tie your laces or tape them.

### Clothing

In Hawkes Bay, most people wear shorts and a top, whether T-shirt or O-top. But you can get full orienteering suits which are lightweight, made of breathable nylon and provide protection from scratches, but still give you complete freedom of movement. Our distinctive club o-tops are nice to run in, they don't retain moisture and they put fear into opposing clubs!

If you are worried about your shins, a lot of people wear lightweight nylon gaiters. Often in areas of pruning or blackberry, this will save you from acquiring unwanted tattoos on your legs, though some people love that.

### Whistle

Sometimes you are required to carry a whistle for safety reasons. In an emergency, the signal is six blasts followed by a minutes pause, followed by another 6 blasts. A plastic whistle is best, it doesn't affect the compass.

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### Compass

Beginners should not need a compass. Until the appropriate compass skills for orienteering have been learnt, the compass will be more a liability than help.

There are two types of compass suitable for orienteering. They are the base plate compass and the thumb compass.

The club has compasses that can be borrowed from the caravan.

### Elastic

The best place to carry your clip-card is by tying it to your wrist with a piece of elastic. There is nothing more frustrating than dropping your clip-card while out on a run. Also, when you pick up your little piece of paper with control descriptions on, most people write them on their clip-cards. This saves you losing yet another important piece of information while on a course.

If electronic timing is being used and it is necessary to use an e-card, then a control description holder is important which attaches to your wrist/forearm.

### Container

Orienteers always have some form of container/plastic bag to hold all their bits and pieces. We have a plastic bag and in it are our compasses, pen, whistles, safety pins, tape, elastic, e-cards, control description holders and string.

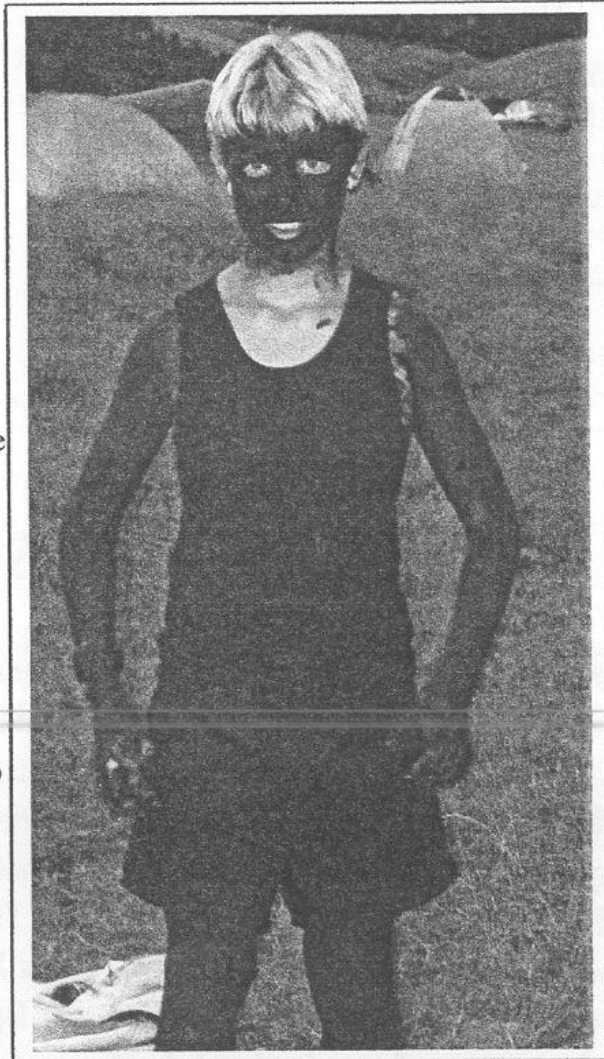

# TOP RESULTS FROM TOP OF THE SOUTH

Around 50 Hawke's Bay club members headed south to spend Easter competing at the Nationals, held jointly by the Marlborough and Nelson Clubs. The Friday morning ferry was crowded with North Island orienteers, who were very grateful for the smooth crossing, even if the full boatload meant we were one hour late leaving and arriving. Luckily no one missed their start times on the sprint course, held in Blenheim's Brayshaw Park. The short course saw Hawke's Bay off to a good start with four wins; Cam Barrett (M10), Jay Barrett (M12), Duncan Morrison (M14) and Jack Vincent (M18). It was nearly a clean sweep for all the boys' junior grades with Scott McDonald missing out on first in M16 by only 4 seconds.

Everyone then drove to Nelson ready for Saturday's classic event at Canaan Downs on the top of Takaka Hill. This was a lovely spot (undulating farmland, areas of native bush, complex depressions and rock formations), the weather was fine and Hawke's Bay again came away with enough titles to keep us happy (9 A/AS titles and 2 B grade titles).

On Sunday the Middle Distance was at "The Big Rabbit" on Rabbit Island. This was pine forested sand dunes that were complicated enough to trip up quite a few runners. Again Hawke's Bay had a string of strong performances with 7 A/AS winners and 1 B grade winner. Those to do the double (Long and Middle in the same class) were Duncan Morrison (M14), Scott McDonald (M16), Jaime Goodwin (W14) and Faye McDonald (W40AS). Ross Morrison had an outstanding run in the Elite grade to come in 2<sup>nd</sup>.

The dinner/prize-giving was held in Nelson on Sunday night. Hosting clubs struggle with the prize-giving format with constant grizzles over the years about the length of the evening as cups and certificates are given out for the top three placings in every grade for the three days of competition. This year Nelson said it would be short – well, it was certainly different. After the meal there was a speaker, Nathan Fa'avae, adventure racer turned orienteer, who was very interesting except the rude behaviour of a group of orienteers made it difficult for some to hear what was said. Then awards were given out to the M/W 10 and 12 grades and the Elites and that was it – prize-giving was over. The cups were left sitting on the table to be collected and certificates are still 'in the post'. Personally I don't think this was the solution to the problem of long prize-givings.

Monday morning saw us all drive back to Blenheim in the pouring rain, but luckily the rain stayed away for the relay events. A lack of very junior runners meant HB could only field four Mixed Short Relay teams (the second leg runner can only be M/W 10 or 12) so suddenly a whole group of HB runners were running Leg 1 in the long relay, along with all the Elites! Everyone rose to the occasion with some excellent runs from relatively inexperienced juniors like Rory Hart and Callum Neil. There were many strong teams competing and Hawke's Bay again fielded its winning relay combination from last year; Ross, Scott and Jack. Could they do it again this year? Ross came back in 7<sup>th</sup>, Scott came back in 2<sup>nd</sup> and Jack went out a minute or so behind Alastair Long (Counties Manakau). However when Jack came back over the final hill heading for the last control he had Simon Jaeger (Auckland) in front of him, setting up the most exciting relay finish I've ever seen. Indecision about the location of the last control had spectators screaming from the finish area, 100 metres away and when Jack spotted it first and was off, Hawke's Bay thought we had the title won. Simon's sprint after Jack saw him close the gap until they reached the finish together. Jack was the one to get his e-card in first – and make it two in a row for Hawke's Bay. And to top it off the Short Mixed relay team of Aari, Jay and Jaime improved on last year's 2<sup>nd</sup> to also win, giving Hawke's Bay BOTH relay events! What a way to wind up a weekend.

To the uninitiated, 25,000 feet converts to 8km. or 5miles, and was the height of the photography that was used to make the base map. This hole is 400m deep and 70m across. Isn't it great knowing how much time was lost on that leg? It used to be a case of thinking maybe the error cost about twelve minutes [or in the case of the elites... about 30seconds]. Added to that we also have the bonus of seeing that we crashed from fourth to thirteenth with one silly mistake!

Congratulations to all those who gained placings at this competition. That is a commendable achievement.

One last thought. Lets raise our glasses to **Sportident**. Surely if the relays had been run the old way, the Long race would have been either a tie or a win to the other team. Well done Jack... the fastest finger in the west!

# North Island Secondary School Champs

Once again Hawke's Bay sent a strong contingent to this year's NISS Champs at Waitarere, making up close to 40% of the 315 competitors attending. Local schools represented were HNHS, NBHS, NGHS, Karamu, Lindisfarne, Iona, Woodford, CHB and HBHS.

Friday's individual events were held on 'Watchtower' in overcast conditions. The courses were mostly through pine forested dunes with excursions out on to farmland. Compared to Hawke's Bay terrain the courses were flat and certainly favoured the fast runners. Usually Hawke's Bay can offer a winning candidate for each grade but we are yet to come home with 6 Championship titles and 2006 was no different. The two to win titles, repeating their winning form just shown at the Nationals, were Duncan Morrison (NBHS) in Junior Boys and Scott McDonald (Karamu) in Intermediate Boys. We had two seconds; Chris McDonald (Karamu) in Junior Boys and Kate Morrison (NGHS) in Intermediate Girls and four third placings; Brett Sceats (Lindisfarne) in JB, Olivia Gregory (HNHS) in JG, Jaime Goodwin (Iona) in IG and Sam Eames (Lindisfarne) in IB. You can see our strength in the Junior and Intermediate grades with Hawke's Bay having a clean sweep in Junior Boys and taking 8 of the 12 placings for those four grades. Both Senior Boys and Girls fields were very strong and the best of the seniors were Jack Vincent (HNHS), 5<sup>th</sup> and Emma Watson (CHB) in 4<sup>th</sup>.

The Standard grades were an absolute clean sweep for Hawke's Bay, taking the 6 titles and overall taking away 15 of the 18 placings. How impressive is that?????

Saturday's relays were held on 'Wanda' and once again provided fast running on farmland, interspersed with areas of pine. The weather was again overcast with rain at times, which caused the organisers experimental 'stick on relay numbers' to fall off most competitors during their course. The HB schools with large teams certainly featured strongly in relay results with HB overall taking 4 of the 6 titles (missing SB and SG) and 14 of the 18 placings.

The Top School Trophies reward strong performances in all grades and even though HNHS only had one top three Championship placing, they have many very good orienteers amongst their large team and this saw them take out both the boys and the girls trophies for the first time.

Well done Hawke's Bay!!!!

Wow!! What huge numbers!! 217 names on the results list and if the family groups etc are taken into account there must have been 240 or so who actually did a course. Apparently this is a record turnout for a Hawke's Bay club event. We have grown to expect big numbers at this stage of the year leading up to the school events but this really was one out of the box.

The numbers certainly tested our systems out with long queues at the caravan for registration and long waits for starting times. The one person on the finish (me) was kept flat out with waves of competitors pouring in with barely a pause throughout the afternoon and no time was available for keeping results up to date. The committee has since considered the issues arising from these large numbers and have decided that at this time of year, when numbers are at their greatest, two white and possibly two yellow courses will be offered to reduce waiting times. More help should also be available in the caravan and at the finish.

What a great chunk of dirt The Slump is – fantastically convoluted, lacking any pattern and really lovely in some places, particularly around the lakes. It is a genuine test of orienteering skills and one I have personally never had a good run on. I looked forward to getting to grips with it and setting some challenging courses. I decided to start at the top (road) edge of the map so that all courses would pass through the most interesting areas. For the longer course this meant they had to drop down to the lower sections of the map at some stage then grind their way back up to the finish. I was disappointed that was the case but I guess compromises sometimes have to be made in course setting.

Congratulations to all the winners. On Red Long Hamish and Derek comfortably kept Jack at bay, for one more week at least. Red Medium was different. This course used to be the preserve of middle aged gentlemen but they have now been swept aside by the club's young stars – seven out of the top ten finishers were under 20, including the first four place getters. As a middle-aged gentleman myself I am seriously thinking of moving to Red Long to escape the competition. The same pattern can be seen in the Red Short, which only a few years ago was dominated by the club's

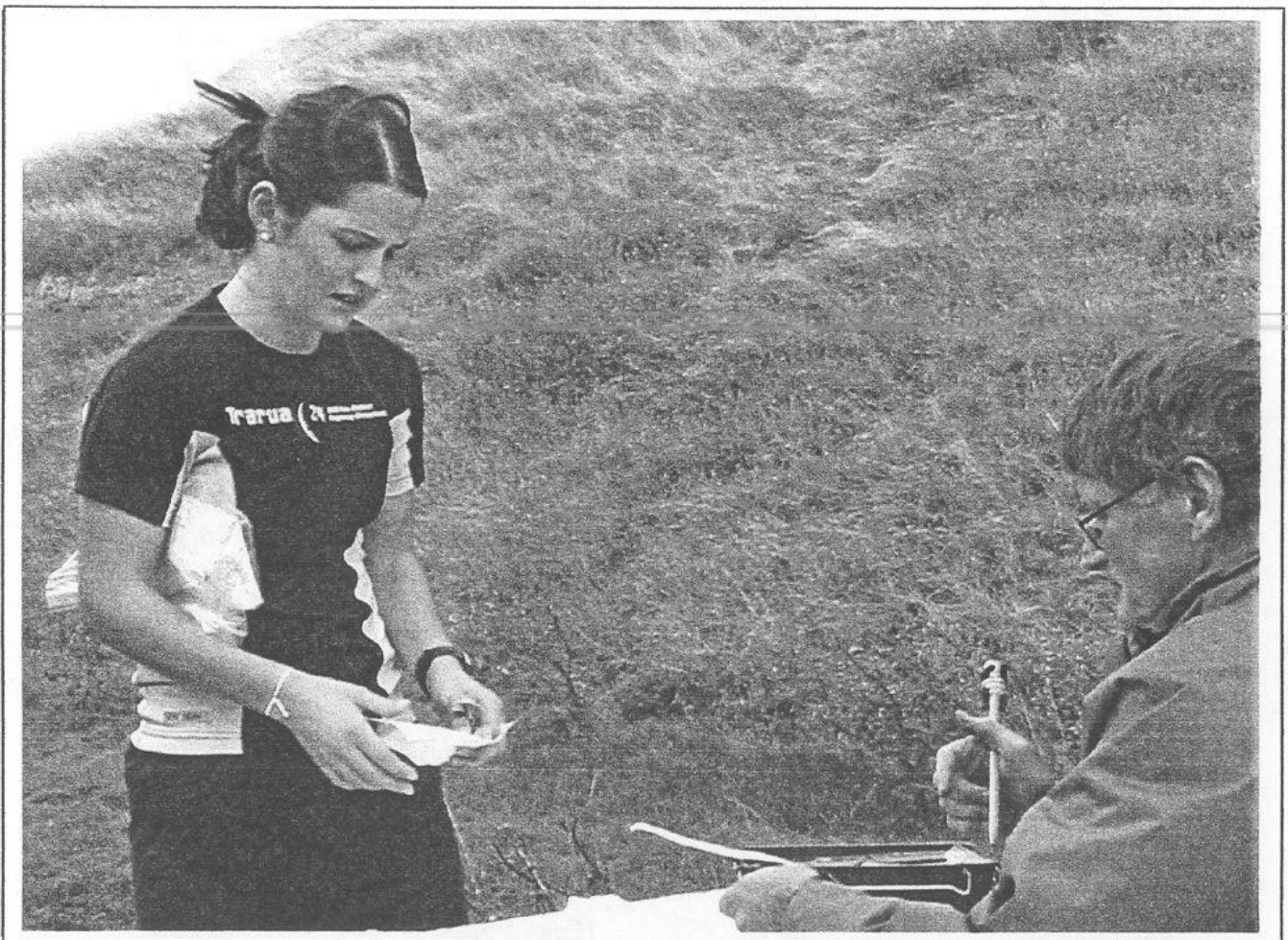


'senior' members. If we take the first three place getters in the Red and Orange courses, both male and female (21 competitors), only five were over the age of 16.

There were a few hiccups on the day. I was certain all electric fences were off and had checked with the farmer on the morning of the event but some people still got zapped – sorry about that. Apologies also to Colwyn, the first competitor on the White course, who suffered from my failure to put out the finish control in time.

The map has been a wonderful club asset for the last twelve years but there have been many changes since it was completed. We provided map corrections for the most obvious vegetation changes but as you would have quickly realised there were numerous other changes not mapped. In designing the courses we attempted to minimise the influence of these changes. This was probably the last time the original Smedley map will be used. Geoff Morrison (field work) and Alan Berry (OCADing) have now commenced work on the new Smedley map which will hopefully be used for a major event next year.

Thanks must go to the following – Ken Holst for controlling the event; he saved me from a number of mistakes, the two Hartree families whose farms they so generously share with us, control collectors Scott, Rory and Christopher, caravan helpers Deborah, Louise and Faye, and finally Hamish, who took home a huge, water-logged bundle of clip cards and sorted out the final results.
