NEW COUNCILLOR

After three-and-a-half years as the Central Districts representative on the NZOF Council, Ingrid Perols stood down at the Council's December meeting. Her replacement is Raewyn Simpson (Rotorua). The NZOF thanks Ingrid for her service and welcomes Raewyn.

APPOINTMENT OF TECHNICAL DIRECTOR

The NZOF is pleased to announce the appointment of Graham Teahan to the new position of Technical Director. From the beginning of 2007, the director, assisted by a volunteer advisory panel, replaces the Technical Committee. The panel is yet to be appointed.

OTHER APPOINTMENTS

NZOF is also pleased to announce the appointments of:

- Carsten Jorgensen as High Performance Director, replacing Clem Larsen.
- James Bradshaw as Development Squad Coaching Coordinator, replacing Neil Kerrison.
- Jeff Greenwood to the Selection Panel, replacing Geoff Mead.

Thanks go to Clem, Neil and Geoff.

Reappointments to individual positions for 2007 are Darren Ashmore (Coaching Director), Geoff Morrison (Secondary Schools Coordinator), Mick Finn (Editor, *NZ Orienteering*), Paul Smith (Webmaster) and Bryan Teahan (Statistician).

NZOF DEVELOPMENT FUNDING

At its recent meeting, the Council discussed the best way to deploy development funding for 2007. The discussion looked at three options:

1. An NZOF funded part-time National Development Officer (as in 2004). This was the least popular as it used up all the funding and one person simply could not cover the country effectively;
2. Regional part-time development or admin roles funded partly by the NZOF and partly by clubs. While there was some interest with this idea, nothing has happened to develop it at a regional level and it also uses up all the funds before any work is done;
3. No funded roles, but all the money used for project based activities, with council regional reps to take the role of spotting opportunities within their areas.

Option (3) was preferred as it maximised the use of the money since none was going on 'overheads'. However it was recognised that some co-ordination is still required, and that this would be done by the regional reps. It was also recognised that the NZOF would need to do more to promote the availability of these funds and the path to access them.

As a first step in promotion, clubs are reminded that "NZOF Development Project Funding Guidelines" are on the NZOF website. Projects referred to in the guidelines include: newer forms of orienteering, permanent courses, orienteering in schools, promotional resources (including web-based resources) and stronger clubs mentoring neighbouring clubs.

The primary aim in each case is to increase participation in the sport with a flow-on effect for the

recruitment and retention of club members. The most recent development grant was in October, being \$1,000 to the Central Districts OA for the development of a regional website.

MISCELLANEOUS POLICIES

Various by-laws and policies which have come into effect as the result of resolutions passed at an Annual General Meeting or Special General Meeting of the NZOF or by the Council, in accordance with the powers invested it under the Constitution (4a), have been brought together in the one document. Titled, Miscellaneous Policies and By-Laws, the document is now available on the NZOF website.

COACHING STRATEGY

The NZOF has adopted a new coaching strategy and this is now on the NZOF website. The strategy aims to weld together the objectives in the national plan, the objectives in SPARC's strategy and the needs revealed by the clubs. It concentrates mostly on coaching for the average club member. Coaching for elite orienteers and for schools, including the role of Kiwisport orienteering, will be addressed at a later date.

AGM 2007

The 2007 Annual General Meeting of the NZOF will be held on Friday 6 April at Wesley College, Pukekohe. In terms of the NZOF constitution, remits for the AGM must be circulated to clubs no later than Friday 12 January. Clubs therefore need to have any remits to the General Manager before that date.

A notice calling for nominations for annual awards will be sent out in the New Year but these can be made at any time.

And finally a reminder relating to last year's AGM. The NZOF Council, as was requested, has completed its review of the High Competition Season (HCS) remit presented to that AGM. The review was sent to clubs for comment on 3 November. If this issue is to be resolved in time for the 2007 AGM, then each club's feedback is needed by the end of this year, if possible.

Volunteer of the Month

November Kirsten Hughes

Although relatively new to Orienteering, Kirsten took up the role of club secretary this year and willingly does all the secretarial duties thoroughly and efficiently, with the minutes and agenda always out in good time plus she is excellent at passing on information to committee members.

How long have you been involved with orienteering?

The sense of achievement in completing a course and there is nothing like the feeling you get when you find that first control – it means you can't be doing that bad!

If we met you during the week, what would you be doing?

Teaching at Gumboots Early Childhood Centre, taxiing a school run or two and being a domestic management executive (mother).



Volunteer of the Month

December Chris Howell

Chris is the club's Landowner Liason Officer which means he contacts all the landowners of the maps we are using for events to check out if it's OK to use the map and if there are any restrictions or issues. This is a really important job because we need the goodwill of landowners in order for our sport to exist.

How long have you been orienteering?

I had several abortive attempts at being an orienteer at school and through my 20s. Didn't seriously take it up until I moved to HB in 1994. I really wish there had been a good club in Hamilton when I was growing up, and that I had discovered it then.



How did you get involved in Orienteering?

I give credit to three lots of people

1. My parents – corny I know, but they introduced me to the sport through Scouts and Guides (strange as it may seem I was an honorary guide in my teen years, great girl:boy ratio back then!).
2. My school – despite the best efforts of the subversive sixth and seventh formers on school camp I always found my way around the course.
3. Myself – for persisting in finding the sport in my thirties.

What do you remember about your first event?

In HB 1994, generally running three times further than I needed to, meandering around The Slump and being beaten by a very junior Morrison to the controls.

What course do you usually run?

Red Long because I am too chicken to drop back to Red Medium (besides it wouldn't be fair...)

What do you enjoy about Orienteering?

I enjoy the physical and mental challenge it presents. No two events are the same and the whole family can compete. The opportunity to see a great variety of NZ countryside. Meeting lots of great people and introducing young people to the sport. I really enjoy setting events, trying to design interesting and complex courses that pit my skills against the club members and trying to force errors from the competitors.

If we met you during the week what would you be doing / what's your job?

Trying to remember where I was meant to be next, looking for THAT piece of paper (so I could file it!) avoiding as much physical work as possible, attending board meetings for a number of wine industry organisations and growing grapes on contract for a number of wineries.

THE 2006 ASB HAWKE'S BAY SECONDARY SCHOOL SPORTS AWARDS

The annual ASB HBSS Sports Awards were held on November 6th in the Century Theatre, Napier. Orienteering maintained its high profile of the last few years with nominations in three categories – Coach of the Year, Team of the Year and Sportsman of the Year.

Geoff Morrison was nominated as Coach of the Year by Havelock North High School for the hard work he has done in the school over the last four years which has seen the school go from obscurity to winning the Top School Award (for both male and female) in 2006. HNHS has a real depth of orienteering talent and is able to field a competitive relay team in each of the six grades, as well as having a good number of runners in both Championship and Standard fields in the three grades. It was no surprise to HB school orienteers that Geoff won the award for Coach of the Year. Well done, Geoff!!

In the Team of the Year Award Orienteering had three nominations – Napier Girls High, Havelock North Girls and Havelock North Boys. Although not winners, the judges awards a combined Merit Award to Havelock North Girls and Boys teams for their top results this year. Once again this is recognition for the hard work done by Geoff and Steve Armon, and not forgetting the talented students themselves. *As an aside, for their efforts the HNHS Girls team was nominated as the August winners for the Sport Hawke's Bay Team of the Year Award decided early in 2007.*

Four local orienteers were nominated by their schools for the HBSS Sportsman of the Year Award; Kate Morrison (Napier Girls), Scott McDonald (Karamu), Emma Watson (Central Hawke's Bay) and Jack Vincent (Havelock North). As usual, the standard of competition for this award is extremely high. Of the 50 nominations the top 10 received Merit Awards (no orienteers this year) and the winner was James Sandall of Napier Boys for yachting.

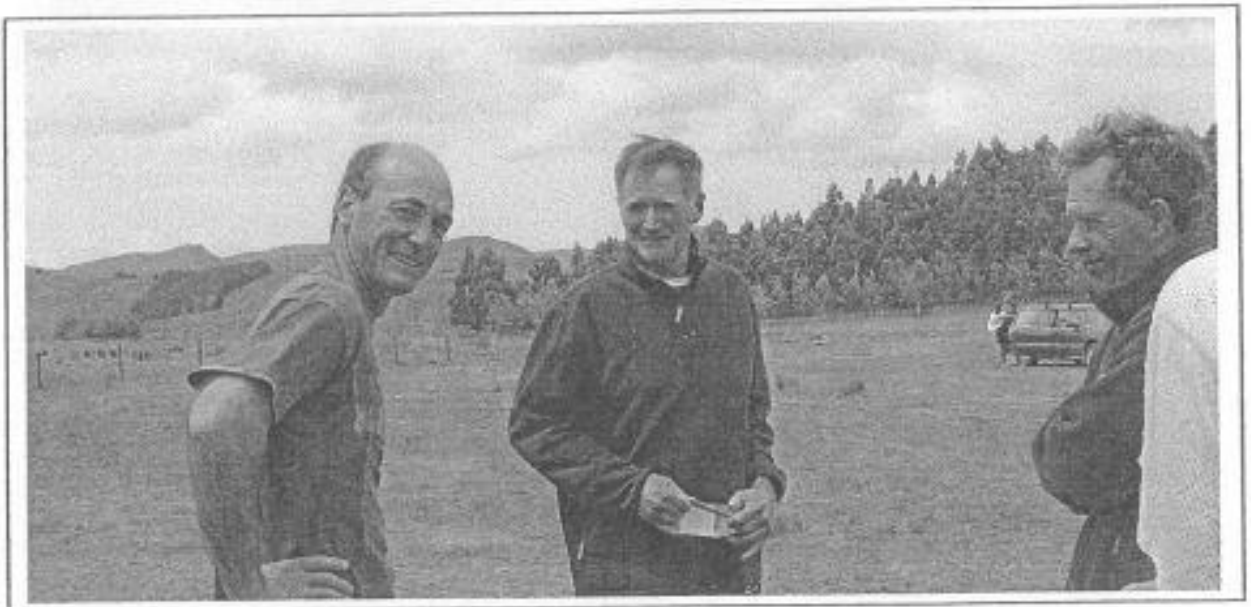

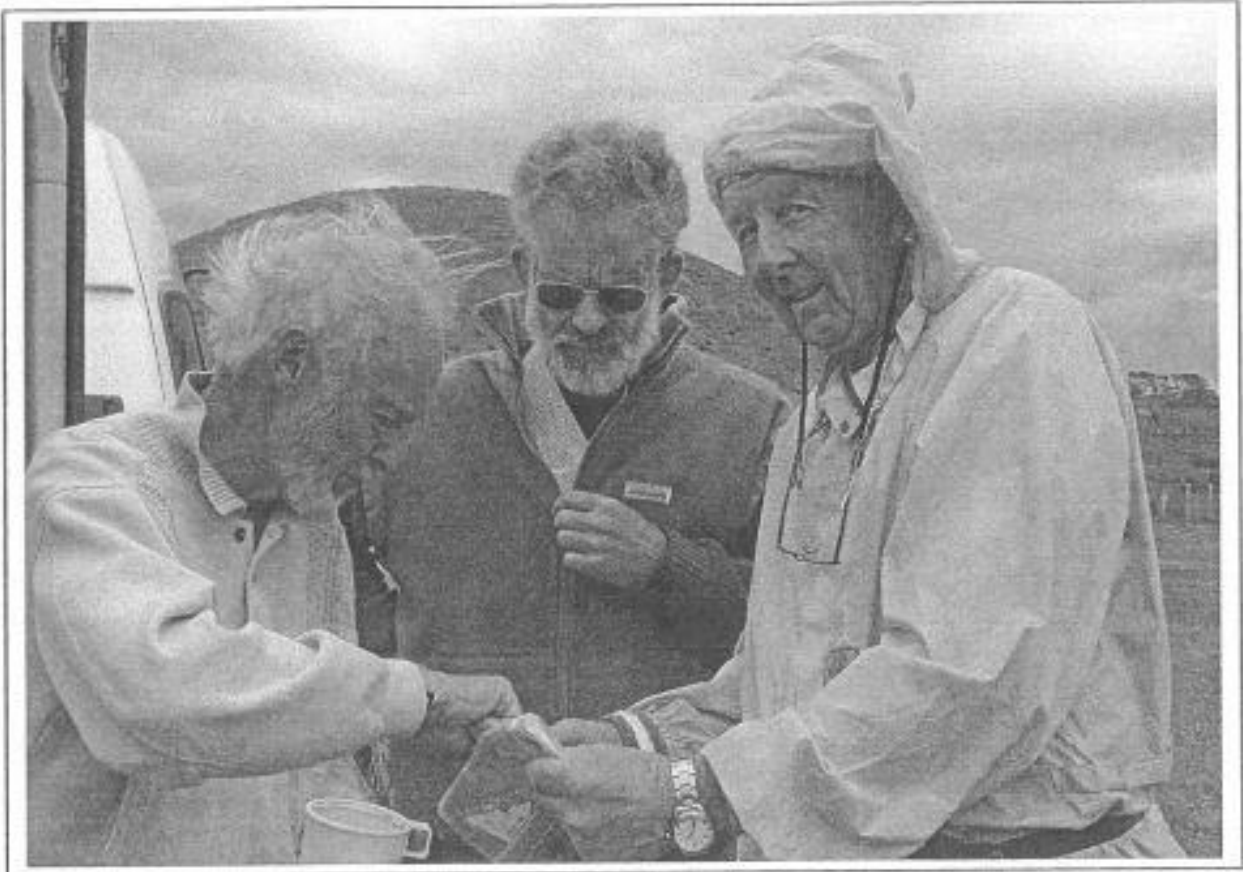

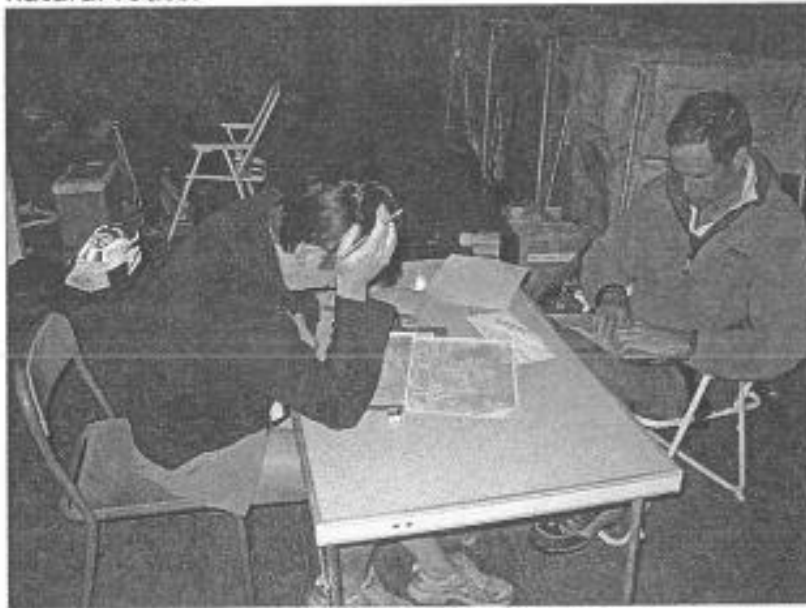

December Dash Rogaine

On a day of extremely adverse weather conditions 50 teams set out on an adventure that would really test their planning, navigation and mental stamina. Unfortunately sunny Hawke's Bay did not live up to its reputation and put on one of the worst days we have had for an event. While a cold day does not matter much, I know many competitors found the squally, heavy rain along with the 3 hailstorms a trial. There was a real risk of hypothermia and the hot water urn got a hammering at the end of the day.

Held at Eland, Trelinnoe, Northlands and Belmont Stations and through Pan Pac and PF Olsen Forests at Esk Valley, the December Dash Rogaine proved to be tougher than expected with many competitors having to severely cut back on their planned routes. Most underestimated the amount of climb and all ignored the dire warnings we gave about uncrossable gorges at some point on their routes.

The setting of the course was deliberately planned to make it difficult to see a natural route.

Judging by the mixture of routes it was clear that many found the planning a tricky exercise. One of the main aspects of the map is the significant amount of climb it offers in the way of many small climbs. It was easy to ignore the amount of contour on

the map as much of it was rolling or gorged with climbs of only 100 –150 metres. There were many different methods of planning, from the careful considered approach taken by Geoff and Pam, to the stick a few pins in the map used by Alad'n'dad (Jack & Keith Vincent), to "I dunno, you do it" "no you do it" "no I'll follow you..."

The country to the north of the start finish was more difficult than the open farmland to the south, but few planned routes that would take them south. The balance of points was fairly even to all points of the compass and the north – south split was based on the Otakowai Stream which forms the boundary

between Eland and Trelinnoe Stations.

The most logical route to me seemed to be one that would include 37, 43, 80, 75, 49, 57, 53, 47, 52, 64, 34, 81, 60, 46, 40, 71, 33, 54, 91, 30, 48, 51, 82, 73, 41, 38 as it avoided the most severe country. A small loop up to the north was also able to be included that could have taken in 65, 56, 62 and 72 (or more). I had thought that maybe 1500 to 1700 would be a winning score for the 12 hour, and I think given that the weather was so inclement and none of the recognised top men's rogaine teams attended, that we weren't that far off that sort of score. Some teams went considerable distances (up to 6 km and time (3 hours by one report) without punching a control.

Winning team "Burnt to a crisp" comprising elite New Zealand orienteer Rachel Smith and adventure racer Rhys Burns took in 37, 58, 70, 92, 74, 45, 63, 56, 36, 50, 35, 90, 44, 62, 72, 57, 49, 75, 80, 42, 64, 47, 52, and 38 for total of 1290. This was a great effort considering the terrain, some of their adventurous route choices and their early swim in the Esk River.

I was also surprised at the frequency with which I heard the words "I know you said not to go there but..." resulting in teams that were bluffed out, trapped in deep gorges or in dead end routes forcing them to double back.

Some experienced teams were pushed hard by the juniors. Best team name had to be the Taradale High School entry "Blame it on Natalie". They also won their section. The other stand out team name came from Ken Holst who said that he was afraid he would "Kill Ted" (Sapsford). I think Ted managed to turn the tables on Ken and nearly had to carry him in. Very few teams were back more than half an hour before the finish time. Only 32 of the 50 teams managed to finish on time and eight were disqualified.

I heard some great stories on Saturday night, and I am sure I will hear a few more as time goes by. I know of one competitor who said he was afraid he would like rogaining only to find out he was wrong.... He loved it! Thanks for coming, and I hope we see you back in Hawke's Bay for another rogaine some day. The last team back was a team of first time juniors who were an hour late. They would have been on time if it weren't for "I know you told us not to go there

but...' In trying to take a shortcut back to the finish they cost themselves over an hour bush bashing their way out of a deep gully...

A few quotes from competitors...

...Just writing to say thank you for a cool rogaine. It was our first rogaine so we will remember it forever and get some cool as laughs from our famous 9 hours (being the last team back and all!). So yea just saying thanks, that it was real cool and once we've got enough courage to attempt another rogaine we'll get back out there and will remember our mistakes/tragic route choice from our first attempt of a rogaine!

...at least we avoided the dreaded dsq...

Now that the event is over I can start to get my life and vineyard back into some kind of order before Christmas!
